## Town and County.

**CATHOLIC CHURCH.**—Rev. Father Blanchet will hold divine services at the Catholic Church to-morrow, (Sunday) at the usual hour.

**REMOVED.**—The motive power of the old quartz mill, which has stood idle so long at the forks of Jackson creek, has been removed, and will be used by Jas. Herd & Co. to run a saw-mill on Poor-man's creek.

**HOUSE BURNED BY INDIANS.**—Dennis Crawley's sold house, about four miles from the military headquarters on Lost river, was burned to the ground by some of Capt. Jack's band last week. No one was occupying the house at the time.

**SAD CASE.**—John Neuber was examined before Judge Watson on Thursday, 13th inst., and pronounced insane, and was on Wednesday, 19th inst., taken to the Asylum at East Portland. Mr. Neuber is one of our most prominent and respected citizens, and it is to be hoped that he will ere long be again among us, entirely recovered.

**SENTENCED.**—J. B. Markham and R. H. Stockton, convicted of larceny, were last Saturday sentenced by Judge Prim to pay a fine of \$30 and \$40, respectively, or be imprisoned fifteen and twenty days in the County Jail. Having a rather exalted opinion of Hotel de Coats, and evidently hankering after free board and lodging, they refused to evacuate the premises.

**FROM LINKVILLE.**—H. H. Gilfray, Esq., arrived from Linkville this week, and reports the weather extremely cold in the Lake country—the coldest experienced there for many years. He also reports that the settlers in the Klamath Lake Basin, as a natural consequence, are strongly opposed to any such peace as proposed with Captain Jack. Mr. Gilfray left for Salem on Wednesday.

**PERSONAL.**—Col. E. W. Stone, U. S. A., who has been acting at this place since the commencement of the war as Quartermaster and Commissary for the Regular troops in the field, left here last Wednesday, in obedience to orders from headquarters, and will probably be located at Yreka during the continuance of our Modoc troubles. The Colonel is a genial gentleman, being an active and efficient officer, and we are sorry to lose him from our midst. Our best wishes attend him wherever he may go.

Hon. J. N. T. Miller and H. Klippel, Esq., left for Salem on last Wednesday. Mr. Isaac Long, of Portland, arrived in town this week, and has assumed charge of the mechanical department of the *Sentinel*. Mr. Lewis retiring.

**THE PEACE COMMISSION.**—General Canby and staff arrived at Linkville on Saturday, the 15th inst., and started for Van Bremer's ranch on Sunday morning. Jesse Applegate and Samuel Case, two of the Peace Commissioners, also arrived at Linkville on Saturday. They met and effected a temporary organization by the selection of Jesse Applegate as Chairman, and Oliver C. Applegate as Secretary. The Governor's protest was presented to them. The Commission adjourned to meet at Van Bremer's ranch on last Monday, the 17th inst., and await the arrival of Mr. Meacham. Mr. Meacham left Yreka on Monday morning for the front, and probably arrived at the headquarters of the Commission on Tuesday evening.

**AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE LANDS.**—H. H. Gilfray, Esq., while at Linkville last Saturday made out lists in triplicate of the selections of the Agricultural College Lands, embracing 88,771.52 acres. These lists will be signed by the Register and Receiver, and one copy forwarded to Washington at once. The total number of acres of the grant is 90,000. 646 acres are located in the Roseburg District, and by being in the limit of the railroad grant will be charged to the State as 1,292 acres. These, added to the amount in Linkton Land District, will make 90,063.52 acres, or 63.52 more than the amount of the grant, which amount will probably be cut off on account of conflicts with prior filings. The list embracing 646 acres in the Roseburg District was forwarded December 24th, 1872, to the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

Considerable snow fell the forepart of the week, but fine weather now reigns supreme.

The Circuit Court is still in session, and will undoubtedly adjourn some time next week.

The number killed in the battle of the lava beds, including those who since died of wounds, is eight.

Lieutenant Moss left Redding, Cal., on Thursday morning, 13th inst., with nineteen men for the scene of hostilities.

A teamster named Joseph Wallace, while hauling Government freight beyond Ashland, fell from his wagon and broke his ankle.

Private Miller, Company C, Twenty-first Infantry, who received a wound in the arm in the Modoc battle, has been obliged to submit to amputation.

A deed has been made by the School Land Commissioners to Andrew Davis, of this county, to certain school lands in Section 37, south of Range 2 West.

The Grand Jury has indicted the Modoc Indians connected with the massacre of the white settlers, and a bench warrant has been ordered to be issued for their arrest.

Louis Tucker, who for the past twelve or fifteen years has handled the reins so dextrously for the O. & C. Stage Co., has been appointed Division Agent. A worthy promotion.

Reports furnished by a former prominent official of Oregon credit the Modoc Indians with 153 massacres of white people from 1846 down to 1861. In some instances they were allied with the Pit River Indians, and their depredations extended to the mountain passes south of Yreka.

**GRAND JURY REPORT.**—The following is the report of the Grand Jury on the public buildings of Jackson County:

To the Honorable Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Jackson: The Grand Jury heretofore empaneled for the February term of the Circuit Court beg leave to submit the following report in relation to the public buildings, to-wit:

We have examined the public offices and find them, as far as we were able to ascertain, kept in good order. We also examined the Court House, Jail and County Hospital. The Court House we find in a dilapidated condition—not such a court house as the wealth of Jackson county is entitled to; neither does it meet the requirements of the population and business of Jackson county.

We find the County Hospital kept in a building not suitable for the purpose. The contents, outside of the building, seem to be all the patients desire. As to the County Jail, we find it a perfect nuisance, unfit to keep the meanest Chinaman on the coast in. The building is so small and close that all the jailors in America could not keep it in anything like decent order if it contains one prisoner. We respectfully recommend to the proper authorities of the county that they build a new jail at once. All of which is most respectfully submitted.
