VAN BREMER'S RANCH, March 18 .-Everything is quiet at the seat of war, and excepting the occasional moving of troops from post to post, there is really nothing going on. A squaw came from Capt. Jack's camp the other day and said the Indians were mad at losing the ponies which Col. Biddle captured. We have now in camp three batteries of the Another street railroad, one and a half Fourth Artillery, two companies of the miles in length, will soon be built in Twelfth Infantry, and one troop of the First Cavalry, making in all about 250 four companies of the Twenty-first Infantry at Lost River, and two troops of the First Cavalry at Clear Lake. The total number of troops amount to 550 or 600. Gen. Canby is very reticent as to what movement he intends to make, for fear the Indians would learn his intentions through the agency of some of the squaw men.

From preparations that are being made I am led to believe that we will move camp before long and completely surround the lava bed.
