Thos. Giannini started this week for Happy Camp with a drove of hogs belonging to Wm. Bybee, Esq. Mr. Bybee will drive about 700 hogs out of the county this year, and put in circulation several thousand dollars hereabouts. Such enterprise surely deserves success.
We learn that orders from Washington send the Modocs to Indian Territory, west of the State of Arkansas, and not to Wyoming. Slolux and Barcho, who were reprieved from the gallows, have been taken to Fort Alcatraz, San Francisco harbor, to which place they have been sentenced for life.

ASSESSMENT RAISED.—The State Board of Equalization has raised the assessments made by the Assessors of Jackson and Josephine, as follows: On lands in Jackson, 10 per cent.; in Josephine, 5 per cent. On horses in Jackson, 27 per cent.; in Josephine, 15 per cent. On sheep in Jackson, 25 per cent. On swine in Jackson, 18 per cent.; in Josephine, 20 per cent.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Joseph D. Cary, aged about 17 years, was killed at McCallister's steam saw mill, on Rogue River, on the 29th ult. He was caught by the main belt and thrown with great violence against the shaft and a revolving pulley, fracturing his skull and otherwise injuring him, from which he died shortly afterwards.

BADLY HURT.—It seems that August Walters, who killed Parker at Ashland, was not so much to blame as represented. He was so severely cut on the head with a weapon, (supposed to be a club) that a doctor had to be summoned to sew up the wound. He was also severely hurt in other places.
