THE CHEWACAN.

The Yreka Union of last Saturday has this in relation to the Chewacan Valley, situated in the eastern part of Jackson county:

Some four or five weeks since, we stated that Robt. Redding had gone with a band of brood mares to the Chewacan Valley, and that he intended to transfer his stock breeding to that locality, and would remove his thoroughbred stallion "Gladiator" there in the Spring.

From this point they passed up Sprague River Valley to near its head. Most, if not all this valley is on the reservation. It is a beautiful valley, well set with grass, and looks as though it ought to be adapted to agriculture.

From Sprague River Valley they passed into Quartz Valley, and thence into Drew's Valley. This is a valley of good size, and is settled, there being some six or eight families, with their flocks and herds.

From Drew's Valley they crossed over a low divide and entered Goose Lake Valley. This valley, as our readers already know, is of large extent, and has considerable population, both in Oregon and California.

From Goose Lake Valley they passed over another divide and descended into Crooked Creek Valley. Crooked Creek is a tributary of the Chewacan, and the valley is well up on the creek towards its head.

The Chewacan river is a small, sluggish and extremely crooked stream which meanders its way through the valley of the same name from east to west, till near where it empties into Lake Albert, when it turns abruptly to the north.

There are in the valley now, it is estimated, about 4,000 head of cattle. Perry Hoyt arrived, while Redding and Olmstead were there, with some 1,200 head from Big Valley.

As already stated, the Chewacan river pursues a very tortuous course from east to west through the valley, till near where it enters, or rather, it fact, spreads out and forms Lake Albert; shortly before it undergoes transmigration into a lake it turns to the north, and the lake, commencing where the river leaves off, continues on in the same general direction for a distance of 20 miles, with a width varying from one to three miles.

They are extremely brackish, almost as much so as the waters of the sea. Olmstead was told that fish abounded in the lake, but what varieties he did not learn.

Rev. S. C. Adams, of Salem, is preparing a historical chart, or in other words a complete compendium of the world from Adam down to the present time. The work will be completed about the first of December.
The S. F. Bulletin of Nov. 7th says: Dr. L. Hall, of Portland, Ogn., has arrived in this city on his way home from England with a number of trained ferrets, with which he intends to exterminate the squirrels in his neighborhood.

According to the Benton Democrat, the Agent at the Alsea Agency, Benton county, means business. That paper says: We are informed that the new Alsea Indian Agent is importing to the Reservation large numbers of horses and cattle, and feeding them out of the provender saved by the "poor wards of the Government."

Rev. F. W. D. Mays proposes to issue a paper called The Columbia Tidings at Lafayette, Yamhill county, as soon as 300 bona fide subscribers are obtained. According to the prospectus before us, the Tidings will be devoted to Christianity, literature, education, the farming, manufacturing and mining interests, and to general intelligence. The paper will subserve the universal interests of orthodoxy, and will especially guard the interests of the M. E. Church South.

The Portland News says that while the attention of the Oregon Steam Navigation Co. has for the last year been directed to the movements of the Portland, Dalles and Salt Lake Railroad Co., Col. Chapman, the President of the latter, has been quietly securing the proper location of the Sandy road to suit the interests, and is the first thing the public learns of his plan is that the Sandy road has become a county road, and Col. Chapman has returned from the Wasco County Court with an order, under seal of the Court, granting to his company the right of way upon the Portage Sandy Road, obviating the necessity of suits between the P. D. & S. L. R. R. Co. and the O. S. N. Co. for the right of way at this difficult place. And work may progress at an early day for the Portage Railroad.
