SWINE.—By far the most hogs slaughtered for many a year in this county are being cured this season. More swine have been also raised the past year, which makes bacon, hams, etc., considerable cheaper than was the case then. Considerable money has also been brought into the county from hogs, by Wm. Bybee, Esq., who has taken nearly 1,000 hogs to adjoining counties. This is a vast improvement on having to import hams, bacon, lard, etc., as was done heretofore.

THE IDENTICAL ROPES.—Dr. F. G. Hearn, of this city, says the Yreka Journal, received portions of the ropes with which Captain Jack and Sconchin were hung, which he now has at his office, and which contain the regular hangman's knot. They were secured and presented to him by Dr. T. T. Cabaniss, who was acting surgeon of the troops in attendance at the execution. Dr. Hearn has a large cabinet of Indian implements of warfare, cooking utensils, pipes, etc., and to it he has added these pieces of rope, and also a cap worn by one of the Indians executed. Besides various articles of Indian antiquity, the Doctor has fossils, and minerals of every description, collected during his residence of nearly 23 years in Yreka. The Doctor presented us with a photograph of himself and Jacob Wagner, two of the twenty-one original settlers in Yreka, in February, 1851, the latter gentleman being at Ashland, Ogn., and the others scattered in the Eastern States, if living, excepting two, who are now in Washington Territory.

Dora Schultz, died June 28th; aged 23 years; consumption; in Catholic cemetery.

Rosa Delia Schultz, died July 6th; aged 7 months and 17 days; cholera infantum; in Catholic cemetery.

Frank Norton, died July 25th; aged 4 months and 15 days; inflammation of the bowels; in town cemetery.

William Wright, died August 23d; aged 73 years; fall from a horse; I. O. O. F. cemetery.

John Williams, died September 25th; aged 40 years; syphilis; in town cemetery.

Lizzie McMahon, died September 9th; aged 20 years; typhoid fever; in Catholic cemetery.

James E. Norton, died September 11th; aged 2 years, 6 months and 25 days; flux; in town cemetery.

Mrs. A. W. Williams, died October 3d; aged 54 years; typhoid fever; in town cemetery.

Clara J. Markham, died Oct. 10th; aged 6 years, 4 months and 20 days; pneumonia; in town cemetery.

Ella Solomon, died October 21st; aged 2 months and 26 days; scrofula; in Jewish cemetery.

David McLain, died November 7th; aged 45 years; measles; in town cemetery.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

A special meeting was held on the evening of January 6th. All members present except Mr. Linn.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Jurors and witnesses fees in the Chinese cases, to the amount of \$39.90, were ordered paid. Marshal's bill of \$32, and Recorder's bill of \$35.25, in Chinese cases, were also ordered paid; also other bills to the amount of \$49. Total amount ordered paid, \$155.90.

On motion of Mr. Fisher, the petition of Day & Rattie, for privilege to extend mining flume, was taken up and read again, and on motion, the same was referred to a special committee—Wilson, Helms and Fisher—with instructions to examine and report at the next meeting.

The Recorder then presented a record of the County Court proceedings in the case establishing a county road within the corporation, which was read.

Mr. Wilson moved that the papers be returned, as he recognized no right of the county to lay out a road within the corporation. Motion carried.

Mr. Wilson called the attention of the Board to the condition of the road and streets, and suggested that work and repairs be done upon the hill road and some of the streets. He also moved that the ordinance prescribing the duties of Street Commissioner be taken up and read a third time and adopted. Motion sustained and ordinance adopted.

Mr. Wilson then moved that the Street Commissioner be ordered and directed to put California Street, between Oregon Street to 4th Street, in good condition, also Oregon Street from E Street to Main Street, by removing the mud and filth, and otherwise improve said streets.

J. P. McDaniel was appointed Fire Warden to fill the vacancy therein.

The Board then adjourned.
