

#### THE KLAMATH LAKE COUNTRY.

A correspondent of the Yreka Jour-

ley as follows: Wood River District, or Klamath tlers to gather it up for winter use. B., now stationed at Fort Klamath. The valley is supplied with two fine streams on the west side, one of them running along the foot of the mountain into the lake, and the other about half a mile from the mountain, also running into the lake. There is no better water on the coast than these streams afford, each being about 20 feet wide and very deep, the water as cold as ice and clear as crystal. These two streams, and also Wood river, never rise or fall at any time during the year, no matter if there were ten feet of snow in the valley in winter to melt off in Spring; hence there is no danger from floods at any season of the year. The valley is surrounded by a fine belt of timber, and the woodman's ax has never yet been used to any extent in this dense forest. The late Modoc war, however, has drawn the attention of a great many emigrants and stock men to this beautiful valley, and I venture to say that by next Spring every foot of land will be

#### AN IMPORTANT BILL.

Hon. J. W. Nesmith, on December 15th, 1873, introduced the following bill to transfer the management and control of the Indian tribes to the War

Department: Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress as-

> either of them. SEC. 2. That the Secretary of War shall be authorized, whenever in his opinion it shall promote the economy and efficiency of the Indian service, to establish convenient departments and districts for the proper administration of the duties now imposed by law on the superintendents of Indian affairs, and upon agents and sub-agents, and to substitute for such superintendents, agents and sub-agents officers of the Army of the United States, who shall be designated for that purpose, and who shall thus become charged with all the duties now imposed by law upon the superintendents, agents and sub-agents thus superseded, and without additional compensation therefor. The Secretary of War shall also detail an officer, not below the rank of brigadier-general, to fill the office and discharge the duties of Commissioner of There is a company organized here, Indian Affairs. Officers of the Army designated to perform the duties of the bonds required by civil appointees, but shall be responsible for any neglect or maladministration according to

rules and articles of war. SEC. 3. That all contracts for supplies or transportation connected with the Indian service shall hereafter be made in the same manner and, as far as practicable, at the same time pro-

vided for supplies and transportation for the use of the Army. SEC. 4. That the Secretary of War shall be authorized to withhold all special licenses from traders, and, unto provide the times and places at which all traders complying therewith may present themselves for bargains, barter and exchange with the several tribes, according to the laws of the
