AN IMPORTANT BILL. Hon. J. W. Nesmith, on December 15th, 1873, introduced the following bill to transfer the management and control of the Indian tribes to the War Department:

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled: That from and after the first day of July, 1874, the Secretary of War shall exercise the supervisory and appellate powers, and possess the jurisdiction now exercised and possessed by the Secretary of Interior

SEC. 2. That the Secretary of War shall be authorized, whenever in his opinion it shall promote the economy and efficiency of the Indian service, to establish convenient departments and districts for the proper administration of the duties now imposed by law on the superintendents of Indian affairs

SEC. 3. That all contracts for supplies or transportation connected with the Indian service shall hereafter be made in the same manner and as far as practicable, at the same time provided for supplies and transportation for the use of the Army.

SEC. 4. That the Secretary of War shall be authorized to withhold all special licenses from traders, and, under regulations to be by him prescribed, to provide the times and places at which all traders complying therewith may present themselves for bargains, barter and exchange with the several tribes, according to the laws of the United States regulating the same.

SEC. 5. That all laws and parts of laws inconsistent with the provisions of this act be, and the same are hereby, repealed.
