Some time after the latter had retired, the house caught afire from a defective flue and was half consumed before the man awoke. The children were fortunately all saved, though great difficulty attended the rescue. We did not learn the amount of the loss.

Letter from Sam's Valley.

SAM'S VALLEY, Feb. 17, 1874.

EDITOR TIMES:

Perhaps a few local items from this side of the river will not be uninteresting to your readers, as we had quite a stir among our citizens on the morning of the 16th inst. D. S. R. Buick, Esq., of Ashland, accompanied by Messrs. Beeson and Helman, of the same place, visited this valley for the purpose of organizing a lodge of Grangers here. The place appointed for meeting was at the School House and at 10 o'clock A. M. nearly everybody was there, together with their wives, sons and daughters, all desirous of hearing the object of the organization explained. At about half past 10 o'clock, Mr. Buick arose and in a very appropriate and able address to a large and anxious audience, consisting mostly of farmers, he explained the object of the Grange movement to the complete satisfaction of everybody present. Mr. Buick, being thoroughly posted in agricultural pursuits, advanced some very bright ideas to the farmers and explained the various ways in which the tiller of the soil was oppressed by the grasping hand of the monopolies; also how they might rid themselves of such oppressors. Mr. Buick then closed his remarks by extending an invitation to all the farmers that wished to become grangers to come forward and give in their names. The number of charter members being limited to thirty, the list was soon filled, and they proceeded to organize. I being an outsider, of course took a back seat. I wish them, however, complete success in their united efforts to burst the iron bands of tyranny and oppression, which has so long baffled the success of the agriculturalist.

I have no doubt but the results of this organization of honest men will in a short time make the hearts of many a farmer rejoice.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

TUESDAY EVENING, Feb. 17, 1874.

A called meeting of the Board of Trustees has held this evening, at the usual hour. A full Board was present, with President Bilger in the Chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A verbal report was made by the Cemetery Committee, informing the Board that they were proceeding with further improvements.

Peter Boschey, Street Commissioner, made a report, stating the condition of certain streets and recommending that they be graveled, etc.

The bill of the Street Commissioner, for cleaning streets, amounting to \$54, was ordered paid.

John Bilger presented a bill for sundries, amounting to \$6, which was referred.

On motion of Mr. Linn the documents received from the County Court were taken from the table and again read, and by motion it was ordered that the county road established by said County Commissioners' Court be opened by the Street Commissioner, and the Recorder was authorized to notify the Street Commissioner of the action of the Board, etc.

Mr. Wilson moved that the Street Commissioner be ordered to clean and gravel Third street, between California and Main Streets, as recommended by the Street Commissioner. Motion lost.

Mr. Wilson moved that the Street Commissioner be ordered to grade and gravel that part of California street lying between Fourth and Fifth Streets. Motion lost.

The annual election of Town Officers was ordered to be held on the 1st Tuesday in March next, and notice of said election to be posted. J. R. Neil, L. J. C. Duncan and Geo. Brown were appointed to act as Judges of said election, and Max Muller and J. H. Stinson were appointed Clerks of election. The Recorder was ordered to notify the Judges and Clerks of their appointment. Board adjourned.

The sound of the plaintive gong and drum could be heard from morning until night, much "blatance" was consumed, and several hen-roosts in town levied upon.
