COUNTY COUNCIL.—The Granges of this county organized a County Council on Monday last by electing D. S. R. Buick President, and Jacob Ish, Secretary. There are at present six Granges in the county, all of whom are represented in the Council.

DENTISTRY.—Dr. Wm. Jackson will be at Ashland next Monday, and will remain a short time. From there he will proceed to Linkville and Fort Klamath, and all those wishing anything in his line can then be accommodated in the most skillful manner.

FROM FORT KLAMATH.—A correspondent at Fort Klamath, under date of March 7th, says that it has been snowing there, without cessation, since Feb. 28th. The snow, by actual measurement, is 5 feet and 31 inches deep upon the parade ground. It is very cold also, the thermometer ranging below zero.

HEAVY LOSS OF CATTLE.—We learn that such has been the loss of stock in Langell Valley, that it is estimated that but one head out of every ten will survive the winter. Many persons in this county, whose only wealth was their cattle, are nearly bankrupted. Stock of all kind will undoubtedly be much higher than it has been for some time.

THANKS.—Hon. J. W. Nesmith has our thanks for a message from the President, transmitting copies of the correspondence and papers relative to the Modoc war. Mr. Nesmith is the author of the bill which caused this document to be printed, and deserves much credit therefor, as it shows the infamous manner in which that campaign was carried on.

MODOC CLAIMS.—Capt. J. Q. Adams, A. A. Q. M. at Fort Klamath, requests all those who have claims against the U. S. Quartermaster's Department, on account of the Modoc war, to forward their address to him, with instructions where they wish their checks sent; also giving the amount due them. He has already received a number of checks for claimants, and will receive others soon.

LETTER FROM BUTTE CREEK.

BUTTE CREEK, March 14th.

EDITOR TIMES:
Thinking that perhaps you and your numerous readers would like to hear from this out-of-the-way part of the world, I thought I would send you an account of what is going on here. We have had snow and mud to our full satisfaction, and the ground is so wet that we are unable to do much in the way of farming; but, while our crops are growing, some of the farmers have been taking steps for the future.

On Tuesday, the 10th inst., D. D. W. M. Buick came into our neighborhood, accompanied by a number of the Patrons of Husbandry, and according to previous arrangements, a large concourse of our citizens met them at the Eagle Point school house. After a short and impressive speech by Mr. Buick, in which he set forth the object of the grange movement, he proceeded to take the necessary steps for the organization of a grange. Upon calling over the names of the persons who had signified their desire to become members, twenty men and ten women responded, whereupon he informed them that the charter was now full; but, for the benefit of those that were anxious to be identified with the movement, he stated that he could receive a limited number as initiatory members, whereupon three men and one woman came forward, registered their names and paid the usual fee. He then politely requested those who did not desire to unite with them in the movement to retire, and after a short intermission, proceeded to organize the grange.

During the recess, arrangements were made to have a grange organized at Mound Prairie school house. On the morning of the 12th inst. a grange, composed of twenty-five men and ten women was brought into existence, and on the 13th at 1 o'clock P. M. was started out on the great ocean of time in good working order.

So you see that the Grangers are kicking up considerable dust in this neighborhood, in spite of the rain, snow and mud.

The Law of Newspapers.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.
2. If any subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, the publisher holds them responsible until they have settled the bills, and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
