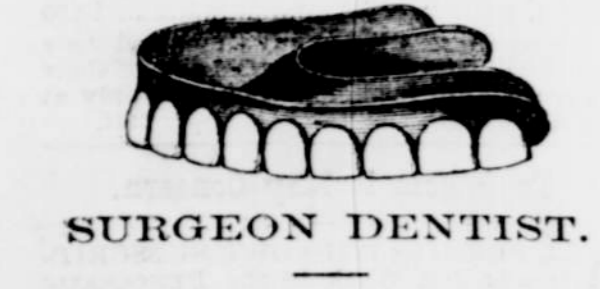

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION. The Democratic Convention of Jackson county, Oregon, met at the Court House, in Jacksonville, on Saturday, May 16, 1874, at 10 o'clock A. M., pursuant to call of the Democratic Central Committee, and temporarily organized by electing Henry Klippel as Chairman, Silas J. Day as Secretary, and John Bolt, Assistant Secretary.

On motion, the Chair appointed a Committee on Credentials, consisting of the following named persons: T. B. Kent, W. A. Childers, S. J. Day, John M. Black, and J. S. Herrin.

On motion, the following named persons were appointed a Committee on Order of Business, to-wit: J. N. T. Miller, Henry R. Brown and John S. Herrin.

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

The following report: We, the Democracy of Jackson County in Convention assembled, declare 1. That we endorse the platform adopted by the Democratic State Convention held at Albany on March 18th, 1874, and pledge ourselves to make every honest effort to elect the nominees of said Convention.

2. We are opposed to the State purchasing or leasing the Canal and Locks at Oregon City, and do hereby instruct our nominees for Senator and Representatives to work and vote against every measure tending to change the present legal status of said Canal and Lock Company with the State of Oregon.

3. We are in favor of a reduction of the existing tax bill, and do hereby instruct our Senator and Representatives to vote for the repeal of said bill, and enact one that will allow a just compensation for the services performed.

4. We are in favor of the State assuming the debt incurred in the late Modoc War, and that our brave and gallant Volunteers who left their homes in the dead of winter to protect our frontier, be allowed the full amount promised them by the State authorities.

(Signed) J. N. T. MILLER, Chm'n. On motion the report was received and Committee discharged.

Being moved and seconded to adopt the report of Committee, Dr. J. Grey Jewell offered the following amendment, which was adopted and made a part of said platform, to-wit:

We hereby tender our sincere thanks to General Davis, Wheaton, and the officers engaged in the late Modoc War, and for the many courtesies shown to our Volunteers in the field. We are also under many obligations to our gallant officers and Volunteers for their brave and patriotic conduct during the late Modoc War, and we hereby tender them our grateful thanks for their well-timed services, and assure them that their conduct will ever remain green in our memories.

Motion to adopt as amended carried. Nominations being the next order of business, the following named persons were put in nomination for State Senator; J. N. T. Miller, John S. Herrin, Thomas Smith. On motion the Convention proceeded to vote by ballot.

H. R. Brown, Fred. Barnaburg and J. M. Black were appointed tellers. Whole number of votes cast, 36; necessary to a choice, 19.

1st Ballot—J. N. T. Miller, 9; John S. Herrin, 15; Thomas Smith, 12.

2d Ballot—Miller, 13; Herrin, 14; Smith, 9.

3d Ballot—Miller, 10; Herrin, 17; Smith, 9.

The name of J. N. T. Miller was withdrawn.

4th Ballot—Herrin, 24; Smith, 12. John S. Herrin having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared the nominee of the convention; and, on motion, his nomination was made unanimous.

G. B. Van Riper, W. J. Plymale, Wm. Simpson, Thomas Wright and Isaac Cox were placed in nomination for Representatives.

1st Ballot—Van Riper received 36 votes; W. J. Plymale, 24; Thomas Wright, 23; Wm. Simpson, 14, and Isaac Cox, 11.

G. B. Van Riper, W. J. Plymale and Thomas Wright having each received a majority of all the votes cast were declared the nominees of this Convention; and on motion, their nominations were made unanimous.

For Sheriff, J. W. Manning and J. H. Russell were put in nomination. J. W. Manning received 23 votes; J. H. Russell, 8.

J. W. Manning having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared the nominee of the Convention.

For Clerk, E. D. Foudray and H. C. Fleming were placed in nomination. E. D. Foudray received 21 votes; H. C. Fleming, 15.

E. D. Foudray was declared the nominee of the Convention.

Fred. Heber, Daniel Walker, Samuel March, M. A. Houston, John O'Brien and Freeman Yandel were placed in nomination for County Commissioners.

1st Ballot—Heber, 18; O'Brien, 18; Yandel, 13; Houston, 10; Walker, 6; March, 6.

No choice. The names of Walker, March, and Yandel were withdrawn.

2d Ballot—Heber, 21; Houston, 23; O'Brien, 28.

John O'Brien and M. A. Houston were declared the nominees of the Convention.

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

For County Treasurer, the names of John Orth, Kaspar Kubli, Newman Fisher, Veit Schutz, M. Menser, were put in nomination.

1st Ballot—Orth received 6 votes; Kubli, 16; Fisher, 12; Schutz, 2.

2d Ballot—Orth, 8; Kubli, 14; Fisher, 12; Menser, 1.

3d Ballot—Orth, 8; Kubli, 15; Fisher, 12; Menser, 1.

4th Ballot—Orth, 8; Kubli, 17; Fisher, 11.

The name of John Orth was withdrawn.

13th Ballot—Kubli, 19; Fisher, 17. K. Kubli having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared the nominee of the Convention, and on motion his nomination was made unanimous.

The following named persons were put in nomination for County Assessor: A. S. Jacobs, V. A. Childers, Calvin Lacy and John Pittman.

1st Ballot—Jacobs, 8; Childers, 13; Lacy, 8; Pittman, 6; blank, 1.

The name of Pittman was withdrawn.

2d Ballot—Jacobs, 9; Childers, 13; Lacy, 7; blank, 1.

W. A. Childers having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared the nominee of the Convention, and his nomination was made unanimous.

For School Superintendent the names of H. C. Fleming, J. B. Farley and Isaac Cox were placed in nomination. H. C. Fleming received 22 votes; J. B. Farley, 11; Isaac Cox, 3.

H. C. Fleming having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared the nominee of the Convention.

For Surveyor, the name of E. C. Mason was placed in nomination, and, on motion, he was declared by acclamation the nominee of this Convention.

For Coroner, the name of Dr. H. T. Inlow was placed in nomination, and, on motion, he was declared by acclamation to be the choice of this Convention for Coroner.

On motion, the nominees for the Legislature, who were present, were called upon, and without reservation subscribed to the platform endorsed by this Convention.

The following named persons were then nominated as the County Central Committee for the ensuing two years, and their nomination was confirmed by the Convention, to-wit: J. W. Manning, Henry Klippel, Wm. H. Simpson, J. S. March, Thos. F. Beall, John Sizemore, Samuel Furry.

On motion, Henry Klippel was elected as Chairman of said Committee.

On motion, it was ordered that the proceedings of this Convention be published in the DEMOCRATIC TIMES.

On motion, the Convention adjourned.

A COUPLE OF NICE SAMPLES SPOILED.—A well-worn falsehood of the Ring has been the statement that A. H. Brown had borrowed \$10,000, school funds, for the Baker City Academy upon security that was practically worthless—the security being the Academy and grounds. This was originally a Bulletin falsehood, and was included in Daph's string of campaign lies compiled from the files of that paper at the beginning of the canvass for the benefit of the snail-fry of the Ring who were to canvass and didn't know what to say. This falsehood was just about "Slippy Dick's" size, and the industrious use he made of it must have been cheering to the Ring heart. In the course of time this invention reached Baker City and now comes back a reply in the shape of a certified statement of the value of the Baker City Academy property, with a detail of a count of expenditures in connection with it, over the signature of its secretary, who happens to be a notorious Rebell; a statement which shows the Academy to be worth double the sum for which it is mortgaged to the State.

Another of these campaigners was to the effect that the present State officers raised the rent paid to the Holman from \$350 per quarter to \$500 by May 1st to \$500. This invention was short-lived. It was promptly met by Holman, in a card, stating that for increased facilities the rent was raised during May's term, and that there has been no increase since the Republican party went out of power.—None.
