OREGON LEGISLATURE. FRIDAY, October 9th. SENATE. The invitation of Dr. Hawthorne to visit the Insane Asylum was accepted, and to-morrow appointed as the time for said visit.

S. B. No. 9, the bill repealing the act providing for the payment of traveling expenses of the Justices of the Supreme Court, was read a third time. The question being shall the bill pass, the vote was taken with the following result: Yeas—Messrs. Barnes, Bristow, Crystal, Engle, Goodman, Jewell, Munkers, Offield, Owens, Richardson, Savage, Townsend, Witham—13.

Mr. Butler introduced H. B. No. 69, to create and provide for the organization of the State University of the State of Oregon. Mr. Lee introduced H. B. No. 70, to provide for a tax on dogs.

Mr. Galloway—An act to amend chapter—of the Criminal Code. The bill abolishes capital punishment, and withdraws from the Governor the pardoning power in cases of murder in the first degree.

Mr. Dufur introduced H. J. R. No. 16, providing for the appointment of a joint committee on the part of the House and on the part of the Senate to investigate and report upon the present condition and management of State lands by the State Board of Commissioners.

On motion of Mr. Plymale the resolution was adopted. The Chair appointed on such committee Messrs. Dufur and Plymale. Mr. Stott introduced H. B. No. 72, to provide for the registration of electors.

Mr. Plymale—J. R. No. 36, providing for the appointment of a committee of three to wait upon the Governor and request that he lay before the House at his earliest convenience the report of the State Auditors of the Modoc war claims, and such other information as may be in his possession. The resolution was adopted, and Messrs. Plymale, Bruce and Lee appointed as such committee.

Mr. Steen—H. B. No. 38, to change the time of meeting of this House to 10 A. M. and 2 o'clock P. M. Mr. Stump—A bill to amend chapter 29 of general laws, concerning fees of clerk.

the attorney of the O. & C. R. R., referring to the bills before the Legislature regulating freights and fares, etc. Referred to the usual Committee.

HOUSE. The following bills were introduced: Mr. Matlock—A bill to regulate transportation on railroads. Mr. Stott—A bill to amend the Act providing for and regulating Justices of the Peace and Constables.

Mr. Steen—A bill to repeal the Acts to amend the Acts relative to pilotage and towage on the Columbia bar and Columbia and Willamette rivers. Mr. Stump—To amend section 4, of chapter 26, of the miscellaneous laws.

Mr. Bradshaw—To repeal section 3 of chapter 2, and section 111 of chapter 11 of the Justices' code; a bill to amend the act to provide for the times and places of holding the Circuit Courts; also a bill to amend section 756 of title 1, chapter 1, of the general laws.

Mr. Reed—To repeal section 946 of the civil code. Mr. Mays—To amend section 2 of chapter 44 of the miscellaneous laws. Provisions for electing Superintendent of Penitentiary by the Legislature.

Mr. Fidler moved to reject. Lost. Mr. McClung introduced a bill to amend criminal code in regard to Justices of the Peace; also a bill to amend the civil code relating to jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace.

Mr. Chandler's bill to exempt a homestead of not greater value than \$2,000 from forced sale from any debts growing out of contracts made after March 1, 1875—the exemption not to extend to any mortgage lawfully obtained; but if the owner be a married man, such mortgage shall not be valid without the signature of the wife to same, was passed by a vote of 46 to 14.

Reed's bill for the construction of State Capitol, granting an additional appropriation of \$110,000 and providing that enough be built to comprise rooms for the various State departments, officers' apartments, etc., was adopted, after an exhaustive discussion.

new code for distribution. Referred to Committee on Retrenchment and Reform. The following bills were introduced and read first time: Mr. Myers—To amend the general laws in relation to elections, repealing sections 4 and 5 of title 1 of chapter 14 of the general laws.

Mr. Clark—A bill to amend an act providing for the sale of swamp, overflowed and tide lands. Mr. Watson—A bill to relieve F. J. Crouch from the disabilities of minority. Also a bill to amend title 5, chapter 50, of the miscellaneous laws concerning bridges and public roads.

Mr. Bristow—A bill authorizing the County Court of Lane county to appropriate funds and levy taxes for the purposes of paying off claims against and finishing the State University building at Eugene City. Mr. Wisdom—80, a bill to amend the miscellaneous laws in relation to the sale of liquors; provides that persons wishing to sell liquors shall, at his own expense, obtain the signatures of a majority of all the voters of said precinct or ward in which such liquors are to be sold.

Mr. Hirsch—81, a bill fixing the salary of the Clerk of the Supreme Court at \$700, and providing for his appointment by the Court. Also 82, a bill providing that moneys paid to the State for swamp lands shall be refunded on lands, the title of which shall not become vested in the State.

Mr. Barnes—83, a bill to repeal the act providing for the payment of the expenses of a Commissioner for the State of Oregon to visit the Centennial Exhibition. Also a bill supplementary to an act providing for the Sandy and Dalles Wagon Road, appropriates \$50,000 out of the Five Per Cent. fund, and the fund arising out of the sale of swamp lands.

Van Cleave—85, a bill to amend an Act relating to the assessment and collection of taxes. Also 86, a bill to amend an Act providing for the construction of the N. P. R. R., and to exempt the property of the road from taxation, except such parts of the road as are completed.

Also 87, a bill to facilitate telegraphic communication between the United States and Asia; grants the right of way and other privileges to Cryus W. Field to lay telegraphic lines through the waters over which the State has jurisdiction. Mr. Cornelius—88, a bill to provide for the loaning of the moneys in the escheat fund.

Mr. Dolph—89, provides that Sheriffs conveying insane persons to the Asylum, shall receive \$3 per day while necessarily so employed, and necessary expenses for himself and the insane person. Mr. Dolph—90, a bill to provide for the delivery of the reports of the Supreme Court to the several Judges in the national Courts, in the Ninth Circuit.
