JACKSON COUNTY.

A correspondent of the Yreka Journal, under date of Jacksonville, Jan. 24th, says this of Jackson county:

It is Sunday morning and warm and pleasant as May, though in the last ten days we've had our full quota of rain, snow, and fiercely driving winds. With snow on every hand, frequently creeping, like frost over yellow stubble fields and darkling meadows, girded by lofty mountains, whose white and broken tops, bathed in genial sunshine, look down on a dreamy ocean of mist and fog with a high altitude and latitude, it is astonishing that this climate is as mild and equable as it is.

A lively, tidy, and promising little town, near the head of Rogue River Valley, on Ashland Creek, one-half mile above its confluence with Bear Creek, a small stream flowing north into Rogue River, at last accounts, it contains about one hundred houses, and three hundred inhabitants on an average.

On Bear Creek, eight miles north of Ashland, a city that was, but now living on the glories of the past, for decay, desolation and death are inscribed on her mouldering walls and ruined temples.

On my return from Boise mines in '64, I rode through this city on a talented mustang. In those days it was the home of lawyers, doctors, artisans and merchants; but 'e'en then it had reached its acme of glory, and was gathering momentum for swift decline.

At a meeting of the County Council of Yamhill county, held lately at McMinnville, among other matters, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the best interests of the Patrons of Husbandry of this coast require the appointment of an agent whose office and place of business shall be across the sea and at such commercial point as may be designated by the executive committee appointing the same.

The following is the Constitution of the Jackson County Grange Council: CONSTITUTION. ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as the Jackson County Council Patrons of Husbandry.

ARTICLE 2. The objects of this Association are to facilitate the transaction of business, in buying, selling, and shipping, and to do such other things as may seem for the good of the order.

ARTICLE 3. This Council shall be composed of delegates from the subordinate Granges as follows: The Master of the Grange and two members elect.

ARTICLE 4. The officers of this Council shall consist of a Master, Overseer, Secretary, Chaplain, Treasurer, Steward, Assistant Steward, Gate Keeper and one Trustee from each Grange represented; neither of whom shall receive pay for services, rendered, excepting the Secretary, and neither of the Trustees shall be Secretary or Treasurer.

ARTICLE 5. Each delegate shall have one vote. No proxies shall be allowed. No delegate shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to cast the vote of any one or more absent delegates.

ARTICLE 6. Each subordinate Grange represented in this Council shall pay to the Treasurer an annual due of one dollar for each representative; and members of Subordinate Granges doing business through the agent appointed by this Council shall pay to said agent such a percentage as the Council may prescribe.

ARTICLE 7. This Council shall hold regular meetings at such place as may be designated by the Council, on the first Monday of each month, and at such other times as the Council may adjourn to. This Council may be convened at any time upon the written request of the trustees. Upon a receipt of such request, the Master shall order the Secretary to convene the Council by giving at least one week's notice to each one of the members.

ARTICLE 8. Nine members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE 9. The officers of this Council shall be elected by ballot, at the first regular meeting in each year.

ARTICLE 10. The Master shall preside at the meetings of the Council, sign all orders on the Treasurer, and do such other things as usually devolve upon this office.

ARTICLE 11. The Overseer shall preside in the absence of the Master.

ARTICLE 12. The Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of this Council, and the account with the members; shall draw and countersign all orders on the Treasurer, and have his books made at any time for inspection by the Trustees or any member of the Council; he shall also convene the Council when ordered to do so by the Master.

ARTICLE 13. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys due the Council, giving duplicate receipts for the same, one of which shall be sent to the Secretary by the party receiving them, shall pay all orders signed by the Master and countersigned by the Secretary and allow the Trustees or any member of the Council to examine his books at any time. He shall give bonds in such sums as the Trustees may require.

ARTICLE 14. The Trustees shall employ an agent when deemed necessary by the Council, who shall be confirmed by the Council, and give bonds in such sum as prescribed by the Trustees. His duties shall be defined by the Trustees, and he shall receive such compensation as may be allowed by the Council. The Trustees shall also have a general supervision over the business of the Council.

ARTICLE 15. No person shall sit as a member of this Council, or act as Trustee, unless he is a fourth degree member in good standing, in some subordinate Grange entitled to representation in this Council.

ARTICLE 16. The rules of order for this Council shall be those prescribed in the Constitutions and By-laws of subordinate Granges.

ARTICLE 17. Any person who may be elected to an office in this Council, and who shall fail to attend three successive regular meetings without sufficient excuse, shall be held to have resigned his office, and the Council may proceed to fill the vacancy.

ARTICLE 18. This Constitution shall be in force from and after its adoption.

ARTICLE 19. This Constitution may be amended or revised at any regular meeting of the Council, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present; provided that notice of such proposed change was given at the last preceding regular meeting.

The following is the Constitution of the Jackson County Grange Council: CONSTITUTION. ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as the Jackson County Council Patrons of Husbandry.

ARTICLE 2. The objects of this Association are to facilitate the transaction of business, in buying, selling, and shipping, and to do such other things as may seem for the good of the order.

ARTICLE 3. This Council shall be composed of delegates from the subordinate Granges as follows: The Master of the Grange and two members elect.

ARTICLE 4. The officers of this Council shall consist of a Master, Overseer, Secretary, Chaplain, Treasurer, Steward, Assistant Steward, Gate Keeper and one Trustee from each Grange represented; neither of whom shall receive pay for services, rendered, excepting the Secretary, and neither of the Trustees shall be Secretary or Treasurer.
