Nevada expects to produce from her mines this year \$60,000,000 in bullion.

Californians are standing on their heads with delight over their crop prospects.

Some hard fighting has just occurred in Spain, and more and harder is expected soon.

Three prisoners escaped from the Penitentiary lately, but they have all been recaptured.

Ex-United States Senator Buckingham, of Connecticut, died at Norwich on the night of the 4th.

The Virtue Gold and Silver Mining Co., near Baker City, cleaned up about \$15,000 in December last.

Much suffering and some deaths have been caused in the Western States by the late severe spell of cold and snow.

The members of Plymouth Church is made up of 1,504 females and 886 males—nearly two women to one man.

The Bulletin behaves itself better than most of our exchanges in the matter of crediting items taken from this paper.

The Oregonian has secured a monopoly of the Associated Press dispatches, at which the Bulletin is greatly enraged.

Reports from all over the Northwestern States speak of the storm on Wednesday, the 3d, as the most terrible for years.

The action of the Governor in commuting the sentence of Gerrard, seems to be generally approved by the Oregon papers and public.

The Oregon Senate and House journals of the Oregon legislature and the session laws, will be finished by the State printer in about two weeks.

On the Connor creek ledge, Baker county, fifteen stamps are running constantly on rich ore, their clean-up for the present month will not fall short of \$10,000.

Messrs. Brown & Stewart, proprietors of the Albany Democrat, will commence the publication of their contemplated daily some time during the present month.

Wm. F. McCrary, postmaster at Baker City, died Jan. 21st, and on the 23d, Geo. H. Tracy had a petition in circulation asking that he (Tracy) be appointed P. M.

King, of Pacific Mail subsidy infamy, is formally requested by the Senate and Assembly of Minnesota to make a clean breast of it or resign his seat as a Congressman from that State.

There has been no change of importance in the condition of affairs in Louisiana during the week. Pinchback is awaiting the action of the Senate in regard to his admission as the pinchback Senator of the prostrate State.

The Millerites have settled upon the 20th of March as ascension day, but the Detroit Free Press says that for men who expect to be in heaven on the 21st, they hold hay and oats wondrously stiff and want their cash down.

Geo. Coggan, of La Grande, charges the rider of his horse "Osceola," that he attempted to sell the race with the Seattle horse, "Tom Merry," having used morphine on "Osceola," and received coin to throw the race off. The project failed, as the race was won by "Osceola." About \$20,000 changed hands on the race.

The people of Lane county are requested to meet at the usual places of voting in their respective precincts, the 20th day of February, 1875, and choose delegates to the county meeting to be held at Eugene, on Saturday, the 27th day of February, 1875, for the purpose of devising ways and means to finish the State University.

On Saturday before last Policeman Rush, of Eugene, arrested about a mile from Junction two men supposed to be parties who are badly wanted both in Nevada and California. They answered the description of two escaped convicts from San Quentin, who also robbed Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express in Nevada. The rewards offered aggregate \$2,800.

The annual session of the National Grange is to be held this month at Charleston, South Carolina. It is said that the reports of the officers will show an immense increase of numerical and financial strength during the last year. We doubt if any precedent can be found in the history of any other association, of a growth so swift

and steady as that of the Grangers.

We had hoped, for the sake of economy, that the U. S. Senate was in earnest when it talked of reducing the President's salary to \$25,000 per year. But it was not. On the 21st inst. Hamlin of Maine, from the Committee on Retrenchment, reported adversely on the bill to reduce the salary of the President of the United States, with the request that it be placed on the calendar with the adverse report. So ordered.

The Postal telegraph bill introduced by Butler, of Massachusetts, on the 25th instant, proposes to declare all telegraph lines post-routes, and the Postmaster-General is authorized to advertise for the transmission of Government dispatches, as carrying the mails is now advertised for. The bill also requires that the rates for special news dispatches and commercial news be the same, and in no case to exceed the rates charged Press Associations on the 1st of January, 1875.

The celebrated running stallion, "Thad Stevens," was sold recently at auction in San Francisco for \$1,100. A couple of years ago, he would probably have brought \$12,000 or \$15,000. He was then the wonder of the running turf. His race last fall, however, in which he was vanquished by "Katie Pease," demonstrated beyond cavil that his racing days were over. He was purchased by W. S. Chapman of the firm of Carr & Chapman. He will probably be kept solely for breeding purposes. "Nell Flaherty," and most of the stable of Geo. Treat were also sold to satisfy a lien on them. The prices obtained were remarkably small.

Wheat Injured.

From letters received from different parts of the Willamette valley and exchanges from the same sections says the Oregonian, we learn that great fears are entertained that a very large number of fields of wheat has been badly damaged by the late freeze.

This we are assured is the case of many fields in Linn, Marion, Washington and Clackamas counties, with some in Yamhill, Polk, Benton and Lane. The counties named constitute the great grain growing regions of the Willamette valley and the loss, though hardly calculable, will no doubt be very heavy. However, should the spring be favorable for seeding, a large acreage in spring wheat will be the result, and an abundant supply for home consumption with a decreased amount for export will be raised. Coming on the heels of a year of very low prices for grain, the loss by the freeze will be a severe one to many of our farmers.
