The Next House.

The lower house of the Forty-fourth Congress will consist of 292 members, of whom all but 17 have already been chosen.

The National Grange.

The National Grange in session at Charleston, S. C., adopted a resolution the 9th inst., declaring the existing patent laws oppressive and requesting Congress to grant no more extensions and to amend the patent laws so as to allow any person to use or manufacture any patent article on payment of a reasonable royalty.

New Hampshire.

The State election comes off on the 2d Tuesday in March. The Democratic Convention has nominated Hon. Hiram B. Roberts for Governor.

Approved.

A dispatch says the President approved the following: An act granting the right of way and depot grounds to Oregon Central Pacific Railroad through the public lands of the United States from Winnemucca, in State of Nevada, to the Columbia river via Portland, in the State of Oregon.

Jesse Pomeroy, the boy murderer of Massachusetts, will be sentenced to death.

It is said \$500,000 will be voted by the Appropriation Committee toward the Centennial.

The Kanaka King and Oregon's Railroad King—Ben. Holladay—dined together in San Francisco.

The profit of the barley crop to the acre in California is found to be fully one-half more than the wheat crop.

Roseburgers have all joined an amateur dramatic troupe and the whole town is now engaged in striking an attitude.

Gen. Howard, commander of the Department of Columbia, is chief exponent at a Forest Grove Methodist revival, now in progress.

W. H. Watkins has gone to San Francisco to arrest the escaped convict W. Burst, whose time in the California Penitentiary is about to expire.

Frank Moulton, in his testimony in the Titton-Beecher trial, the other day, admitted that Ben. Butler wrote his famous "statements" of last summer.

A Salem man has invented a simple contrivance of holding a box of blacking so that a gentleman can black his boots without also blacking his fingers.

Assistant Warden Thompson, of the Penitentiary, week before last recaptured the escaped convict, Brown, near Comstock's Mill, in Douglas county.

There will be two eclipses of the sun this year. One, April 6th, not visible in the United States; the other, September 29th, visible east of the Mississippi.

Tilton swore in court the other day that his own age is 39, and his wife's 41. Beecher's friends some months ago had a jollification on that remarkable man's 61st birthday.

A desperate effort is to be made by this Congress to admit Colorado and New Mexico as States. Their admission might complicate the next presidential election if it goes to the House.

There is a man named Arraguett, living in Clackamas county, who is 95 years old and has been in Oregon 70 years. He thinks he will like this country as soon as he gets used to the climate.

The editor of the Plaindealer recently heard a miner say that he would find gold, and have a working and paying claim within twelve miles of Roseburg in less than three months. We hope it is so.

David Goff, father of Mrs. Col. Nesmith, as well as of Mrs. C. D. Burkhardt of Albany, died at his home in Polk county Saturday, Feb. 6th, aged 80 years. He was one of Oregon's earliest pioneers.

The Record says: Although the supreme court has adjourned, the judges are busily employed preparing opinions in the cases already decided, so that they can be embodied in the volume of supreme court decisions.

On the 6th inst., a bill passed the Senate for the relief of Major Drew of this State. The bill authorizes the treasury to credit his paymaster account with \$20,000 for disbursements made on vouchers lost in transmission.

Fred Douglas, has been interviewed, and says the political whirligig in Massachusetts was caused by the treatment of Chas. Sumner by the Republicans in the State, and that the Presidency is in the hands of the Democrats if they act wisely.

The public debt statement for January shows an increase of \$1,398,000. But then we have the consolation of knowing that it will be reduced this month to help carry New Hampshire on the 2d Tuesday of March. If it were not for these elections our country would get hopelessly in debt!

The Mark Lane Express, February 2d, in its weekly review of the English wheat market, reports that floods have caused great damage to the crops in the ground, while extensive shipwrecks have interrupted the market supply of cereals. On this account the downward tendency of prices was arrested, though it does not note an advance.

T'oung Chi, the Emperor of China, died on the 12th of January. He ascended the throne in 1861, when only 5 years of age. At the time of his death he was 19. His legitimate successor is a little boy only 5 years of age. The Empress is said to have suicided shortly after her lord's death, but it is also suspected that she was spirited away by interested parties.
