MODOC WAR BONDS.—Secretary of State Chadwick has been busy affixing official signatures to the Modoc War bonds, and they will be ready for delivery ere long.

DIED FROM HIS INJURIES.—John Payne died at his residence near Phoenix last week, from injuries received by a horse falling upon him some time since. He was buried on Friday last.

HEAVY EXPENSE.—The case of the State of Oregon vs. Walter and William Brown having been transferred to Lake county, this will be a heavy burden on our neighbors, considering that their county organization has just been launched into existence. They must grin and bear, however.

TRANSPLANTING.—A large amount of fruit and shade trees have been and are yet being transplanted. C. C. Beekman had some maple trees set out alongside the Express Office this week, which will be a useful ornament in the future. We hope to see several more improvements of this kind made.

TRAINING.—This week, in company with Hon. W. J. Plymale, we visited the race-track. Here we found several horses being trained in the mysteries of trotting, some of which were progressing finely and promised well. Several more are being worked, but were not on the track at the time. W. F. Drannan is at present working four horses, S. Booth, three, James A. Wilson, one, S. R. Taylor, one, while several others, whose names we cannot recall at present, are handling as many more. We will at some later day give a more detailed account.

FROM LAKE COUNTY.—A letter from Big Springs, Lake county, under date of March 1st, gives these items: Trout are still running up Lost River. The water in that stream is low. Nourse & Miller propose starting a store here as soon as the mill is running.

Several cattle merchants from California are buying in this county at present. A spelling school is the latest novelty here. Tri-weekly sessions are held. Everybody participates.

Big Springs aspires to be the county seat of Lake. Being centrally located, it offers great advantages as such. Cattle are bringing better prices now than they have been for some time. Four cents a pound is the price received.

Shook & Co.'s saw mill will be in running order in May next. It will be an important enterprise for the surrounding country and will doubtless prove a paying investment.

Harvey appointed instead. The report of Bolivar Hull, as Supervisor of District No. 36, was examined and approved. W. G. Knighton was appointed Supervisor of said District for ensuing year.

In the matter of the application of Henry Brown and others for county aid to Mrs. Merritt. E. D. Foudray, County Poor Agent, was authorized to make any arrangement he may deem advisable for her relief. Bills to a considerable amount were audited. ALDEN FRUIT DRYER.—We learn that there is some talk of starting an Alden fruit-drying establishment in this county. A large amount of fruit annually goes to waste, and this process would be an excellent method of utilizing it. There is no reason why it should not prove a paying investment. The persons starting this enterprise would have no difficulty in supplying the whole of Southern Oregon, as well as neighboring counties of California, with dried fruit, for it could be manufactured at such reasonable rates that it would effectually do away with sun-dried fruit, between which and the Alden-dried fruit there is no comparison. Several counties in the State have invested and Jackson should not be behind in this important matter.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

Circuit Court next Monday. No marriages for several weeks. Louis B. Tucker has gone North. St. Patrick's Day next Wednesday. Grouse hunting is the latest novelty. The pleasant weather has started the grass. Assessor Childers will receive poll tax now. Open meeting at the Literary Society tonight. The stages arrive daily heavily loaded with mail. Alex. Martin is engaged in sheep and cattle raising. "Dad" Bybee, of Lake county, was in town this week. The new Board of Trustees held a regular meeting last night. Justice Stinson's Court has been grinding quite lively of late. The Jacksonville District School closed another quarter last Friday. Eggs are so abundant that they can be procured at 12 1/2 cents a dozen. David Linn will execute the carpenter work in the new Masonic building. Deputy Sheriff Kent is busy subpoenaing in connection with the Circuit Court. For horse bills, executed in good style and at reasonable rates, call at this office. The farmers have about finished sowing. The early-sown grain is coming up finely. John McPherson died at Judge Tolman's on Feb. 27th, of inflammation of the bowels. There were more strangers in town this week than have been here for a long period. Geo. B. Walrod, who resided at Ashland last Summer, died at Sycamore, Ills., a short time since. Work is progressing finely on the new Jail. At the present rate, it will be completed in a short time. W. I. MINING NEWS.

Surveying claims is progressing at a rapid rate. Wm. Bilger is engaged in getting out a ton of rock at Galice Creek, to be shipped to San Francisco for testing. We learn that from \$2 to \$5 a foot is being offered for claims on Galice Creek, but nobody seems anxious to sell. The Oregon papers contain considerable correspondence from parties who have been at Galice Creek, all of which speaks favorably of the new mines.

Over 150 claims on various ledges in the county have already been recorded in the Clerk's office. Several claims upon which notices have been posted are not recorded as yet. A large number have also been recorded by the Clerk of Josephine. Parties just from Galice Creek report matters in statu quo. Improvements are still progressing. S. Harkness is putting up a hotel and feed stable. A saw mill is being erected near the ledges. Comparatively few shafts have been sunk and those not to any great depth. Mr. Scott, who has just arrived from the mines, says he has traced the Galice Creek ledges as far as Cow Creek, where a well defined lead is developed. The ledges all seem to come to a focus here, as the width of the new discovery is over a mile wide, interspersed with stratas of apparently different kind of rock, but which he thinks is the same ledge. The leads can be traced no further. Mr. Scott brought several pounds of rock with him, which will be tested in the mill of Brooks & Co., on Wagner Creek.

ROAD REPORT.—The following report has been handed us for publication: To the People of Jackson and Josephine Counties: We, your committee appointed at the miners meeting held at Galice Creek on the 26th day of February, to view the different routes proposed for the building of a wagon road to the Yank Ledge, after examination of the three routes proposed, to-wit: The County road on the west side of Rogue River. The Jump off Joe route crossing Rogue River at Umpqua Joe's Ferry, and the trail from Quartzville to Grave Creek, report that in our estimation the Jump off Joe route is the shortest, cheapest, and will be of the most utility to the public in general. Therefore, we recommend that it be built as soon as possible, as the miners have no means of obtaining supplies except by means of a very indifferent pack trail.
