RADICAL BUNCOMBE.

Finding themselves unable to cope with the Democrats on legitimate issues, the Republicans have of late undertaken to revive the old war hatred, expecting to frighten a few into their support by crying "rebel," "traitor," and accusing the Democracy of attempting to divide the Union, should it again come into power. A few may have been influenced by this claptrap, but the recent elections show that the people at large take no stock in it. Leading lights of the defunct Confederacy, yet disenfranchised, most liable to entertain the bitter animosities of the late strife, have time and again counseled devotion and loyalty to the stars and stripes. In many places Federals and ex-Confederates have joined in a joint decoration of the graves of the dead soldiers, and general good feeling prevailed throughout. Even Jeff. Davis, in an address to the Texas veterans of the Mexican war, at Houston, on May 14th, entreated them to be as loyal now to the stars and stripes as they have been zealous and brave in the defense of their first flag. The Democrats entertain no intention of secession whatever. All they desire is a purging of the corruption and inefficiency that prevails in every department of the United States, the equality of all sections in the immunities and privileges accorded the most favored States, and a return to the prosperity and dignity enjoyed by our Nation in the good old days when Democracy reigned supreme. And to all appearances, that party will be found in full force and in fine condition in November, 1876, eager for the fray.

Talk will avail the Republicans nothing. "Actions speak louder than words," is a very good proverb, and they will find to their sorrow that it is but too true.

Writ of Special Election.

To the Sheriffs of the several counties within the State of Oregon:

WHEREAS, At a general election held on the first day of June, A. D. 1874, Hon. George A. La Dow was duly elected Representative of the State of Oregon in the Forty-fourth Congress of the United States; and

WHEREAS, Since the said election, said office has become vacant by the death of said incumbent; and

WHEREAS, By provision of the Constitution of the United States, and the laws of this State, it has become the duty of the Governor thereof to issue his writ of election to fill such vacancy;

Now, therefore, I, L. F. Grover, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby command you and each of you to notify the several Judges of Election within and for your several counties, to hold a special election of Representative in Congress to fill the vacancy aforesaid, on Monday, the (25) twenty-fifth of October, 1875, and that you cause all proper notices to be given thereof according to law.

Given under my hand and seal of the State of Oregon, at Salem, this fifteenth day of May, A. D. 1875.

The Special Election.

Governor Grover has called the special election for Congressman, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Geo. A. La Dow, for October 25th. This date is one week after the close of the State Fair and at a period best suited for the people at large, as the farmers will then about be finished with their Fall work.

GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

The Chinamen of Eugene have taken to patronizing the photographers. They will take to religion next.

Red Cloud is reported as saying that 500 men are already encamped in or near the new gold fields in the Black Hills.

David Osment, the oldest Freemason in England, died recently. He was born on the 21st of June, 1775, and joined the Order in 1810.

There is talk of placing the steamship Idaho on the route between Portland and San Francisco as an immigrant ship, with low rates of freight.

O. A. Tibbitts, of Eugene City, has the latest curiosity—a deer's horn that was found imbedded in the heart of an oak tree that was fully two feet in diameter.

Gen. John C. Breckenridge died at Lexington, Ky., on the 17th. He died, it is supposed, from injuries received by the bursting of a shell during the rebellion.

Langley's Directory of San Francisco for 1875 sets down the population of that city at over 230,000, which the San Francisco Bulletin considers about 30,000 beyond the facts.

The number of Sunday Schools in the United States is 68,309; teachers, 740,970; scholars, 5,637,307—according to the report of the Statistical Secretary of the International Sunday School Convention, now in session at Baltimore.

The first-class overland passengers on the 29th of April numbered 194, with 275 emigrants. Ten thousand immigrants came during the month of March, and 3,500 during the first seven days of April. So says a California paper.

At Portland citizens are perfecting the organization of an Agricultural and Mechanical Park Association. It is proposed to buy about ninety acres of land at a cost of \$50,000, and expend \$54,000 in buildings and general improvements.

The latest is that President Grant has not denied his charged aspirations for a third term for the reason somebody threatened to assassinate him if he did. The thinness of this of this last story is beyond the comprehension of mortal man.

The scandal trial in Brooklyn has developed this much: No good man or woman can have special sympathy for either side. Both have been shown to be vicious. There is no room for honest sympathy to warp a calm judgment as to the one fact at issue in the trial.

A dispatch dated Lexington, Ky., May 13th, says: In the races to-day the first race, mile heats, was won by Searcher, who distanced the other two entries, Light Coin and Lost Fortune, in first mile, making it in 1:41 1/4, the fastest time on record. Last year Grey Planet ran a mile at Saratoga against time in 1:42 1/4.

In the case of Anna Eliza vs. Brigham Young, being an application for writ of attachment to compel payment of \$500 per month alimony, pendente lite, as awarded by Chief Justice McKean, a decision was rendered by Chief Justice Lowe, denying the attachment and discharging the rule, for the reason that the marriage was not a legal one.

Forty thousand coal miners of Pennsylvania have suspended labor during the last three months rather than yield to a reduction of wages proposed by their employers. There seems to be little probability of a compromise being effected so long as the striking miners shall be able to draw slender pecuniary supplies from the associations by which these labor movements are directed.

From immigration statistics published in the Eastern papers it would appear that there was a falling off in the number of immigrants last year from foreign countries of 160,000 as compared with the year previous, and that the tide of immigration from the United States is increasing. The cause of this change against this country is attributed to a scarcity of work and a general depression of all industry.

A New York dispatch dated May 15th, says that the detectives connected with the capture of Lawrence, say the silk combination to defraud the revenue is one of the greatest conspiracies ever formed. It numbers about 500 members, many being men of wealth and position here and abroad. Its most extensive ramifications were in England and on the continent, agents being kept in nearly every port.

More revenue frauds have been discovered in Chicago, St. Louis and Milwaukee, and arrests accordingly made. The commercial editor of the St. Louis Democrat first discovered the tricks of the whiskey ring, and obtained authority to ferret them out. A Washington special says the discovery of these frauds is the real reason for the displacement of Commissioner Douglass, though he is in no way implicated.

The Statesman says: We learn from a reliable source that the Meacham Indian troupe has not proved a success in financial matters but has been a decided failure. At last accounts the company was in New York and had an engagement for a week and hoped to improve a past want of success. The failure was attributed to its being advertised as an Indian show instead of as a lecturing expedition. A different plan of advertising was to be adopted hereafter.

Democratic Gains.

The Albany Argus, of April 10th, gives a summary of the results of the New York town elections, up to that date. The Democrats have carried seventy-three more of them than the Radicals. In 1872 the Radicals had a majority of two hundred and seventy-five, so that the Democratic gain since then is three hundred and forty-eight; and their gain over last year is fifty-six. Who says any political reaction, against the great party of the people, is likely to take place?

Wheat Prospects in the United States.

The report of the Department of Agriculture, published in this week's dispatches, and the special reports from Pennsylvania in the same, go to show that in the great wheat producing States of the Union, including the Ohio and Western Valleys and the great States of New York and Pennsylvania, not much over half a crop of wheat may be expected. We know that the average condition of things in California is even worse and it is very probable that Canada shares in the evil reports. If these fears are all realized, says the Record, the falling off in the American supply will be from 50,000,000 to 70,000,000 bushels, one fourth of the deficit being in the single State of California. The reports from England and Europe so far are of a favorable growing season, but the European harvest comes late as ours, much of it, and they do not have our reliable seasons to depend upon. Oregon seems bound to harvest an abundant yield again and as the deficiency in California is almost certain to keep down freights, there is a not remote possibility that the Willamette shall have good prices and splendid times another year, and at the same time we may as well remember that there are several "ifs" in the way. Let us go slow until we see the result.
