CIRCUIT COURT.—The regular June term of the Circuit Court will convene next Monday, June 14th.

MASONIC GRAND LODGE.—T. G. Reames and N. Langell will leave today for Portland, to be in attendance on the Masonic Grand Lodge, which meets in that city next week. They are delegates from Warren Lodge No. 10.

GONE FROM OUR GAZE.—Harris and Johnson, the negroes convicted at the present term of Court for larceny, and sentenced to the Penitentiary for six and seven years respectively, were last Friday taken to Salem, in charge of Deputy Sheriff Kent and P. D. Hull.

ENORMOUS PIE PLANT.—David Linn brought to this office on Friday last a large pie plant, which measured 3 feet 7 inches across the leaf, 3 feet 3 inches from the stem to point, and the stem of which was 4 inches in circumference. It was raised by Mrs. L. Chappel, of Applegate.

DISCHARGED.—James Wilson, the youth brought from Crescent City, and also "Old Joe," the negro arrested near Waldo, Josephine county, who have both been confined in jail in relation to the case of Albert Johnson, were last week discharged, there being no apparent cause for their further detention.

RUNAWAY.—John Orth's team, while standing in front of the butcher shop Monday last, became frightened and ran up street at a lively gait. They had not proceeded far, however, when they turned the wagon upside down, which brought them to a sudden halt. The bed of the wagon was somewhat damaged, which constitutes about all the injury done.

INDIAN LOST.—We learn that Teumseh, the remaining Klamath Indian in Meacham's expedition, who was in the stage last week, on his way home, got out to walk while coming over the Siskiyous, since when he has not been heard of. The managers of that expedition are under heavy bonds for the safe return of the Indians, and the loss of Dave Hill and, perhaps, Teumseh, will be severe on them.

NEW POST OFFICE.—Application is about to be made to the Postmaster-General for the establishment of new post offices at the Meadows, on Evans creek, and at Flounce Rock. Postmaster Muller has forwarded a diagram of the proposed route (which is an extension of the present Brownsborough route) to Postal Agent Underwood, for his endorsement, of which the following is a synopsis: commencing at Jacksonville, and running to Central Point; thence to Sam's Valley; thence to the Meadows; thence to Hull Brys' place, at Flounce Rock; thence to Eagle Point; thence to Brownsborough, and thence to place of beginning. Henry Mitchell is recommended as the Postmaster of the Meadows P. O., and Mr. Hull as P. M. of the Flounce Rock P. O. The establishment of these post offices would accommodate a considerable population now deprived of mail facilities, and we trust the application will be granted and the route in order ere long.

MINING NEWS.

Some very rich cinnabar was brought in the other day from Cooling & Co.'s claim in the Evans creek district.

Messrs. Constant, Owen and Coates are prospecting for cinnabar up on Rogue river. They expect to find it in paying quantities.

Rich placer diggings are reported to have been discovered near the Beaver creek cinnabar mines. We learn that some nuggets, weighing several dollars, have been picked up, and there are other evidences of the richness of the discovery.

From Hon. Henry Klipper, who has lately returned from the Elizabeth ledge, we learn that everything is progressing finely there. Another cleanup will be made in five or six weeks, and the prospects for a good run are more favorable than ever.

The placer mines on Briggs creek, Josephine county, are beginning to speak for themselves. A nugget weighing \$107 was recently found in the original discovery claim. Other smaller pieces have been picked up, and the reports from that section are very favorable.

Some pieces of float cinnabar from the Beaver creek cinnabar mines were brought to town last week by W. M. Turner. They are of large size, heavily laden with the live ore, and it would not take a large quantity of this kind to make the possessors all right in a financial point of view, even if quicksilver was considerably lower than it is at present.
