GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

Camp-meetings have broken out all over Oregon. Italy will not join in the Centennial, because of the expense.

There were only 73 accidents in New York on the 5th from fire-works. Fifty-five mining claims have been recorded in Douglas county during the past two months.

The annual State Teachers' Institute will be held in Salem on the 1st, 2d and 3d days of September.

A further dispatch from Professor Jancy reiterates a former statement that he has not found gold enough to warrant any extended mining operations in the Black Hills.

In the pigeon shooting match at Hendon, England, the other day, between Bogardus, of Illinois, and Remmel, champion of England, the former won easily by shooting thirty-six out of fifty, and the other thirty. Bogardus challenges all England to shoot against him.

The engineers who surveyed the route for the Corvallis and Yaquina Bay railroad report it not only practicable, but a really good route.

The Record says Miss Alice Bolen, about 14 years old, living three miles from Turner, Marion county, has completed a bedquilt which contains 8,427 pieces, all stitched by hand and neatly done—mostly of cotton goods.

The 6th of August next will be the centennial of the birth of the Irish liberator, Daniel O'Connell, and it is proposed on that day to lay the corner stone for a monument to his memory in Central Park, New York.

There was a further examination on the 6th of Joseph Leoder, charged with perjury and conspiracy against Beecher. Beecher was called as a witness, and said there was not one word of truth in the affidavits of Leoder and Price.

Lately in New York, in an address on the labor question, a Mr. S. Royce presented social and mortuary statistics that prove that as many persons die every year of consumption among poor as die of all diseases among the wealthy.

That affair of Leoder and Price, the supplementary Beecher trial witness, looks very ugly. It is reported that Leoder's story, which was very strong indeed, and went to fix the crime of adultery on Beecher, is now admitted to have been fabricated, through and by the suggestion and assistance of Tilton and some of his counsel.

IMPORTANT TO WOOL GROWERS.

The following letter from R. Jacobs, President Oregon Woolen Manufacturing Company, is very important to all our wool growers:

EDITOR BULLETIN: My attention having been called to a small item in your paper regarding the price of wool, that the mills here are compelled to buy their wools in San Francisco, because it is cheaper, etc., I will say that such is a mistake.

Wells, Fargo & Co. withdrew their express business from Colorado Territory on the 1st of July.

I must also call the farmers' attention to the manner of putting up their wool. Heretofore they have not been particular enough in having it put in good shape, but they would put in tags and other rubbish, and in some instances old clothing, sheep skins, etc.; and they should be more particular hereafter, as all these things have an effect on the price.

I am writing this letter for our benefit as well as the farmers, as our interests are alike. Our aim is to make fine goods and to establish a reputation for our manufactory as well as for the State of Oregon, and to let the world see that Oregon, though a new country, can and does to-day, compete with the best fabrics made in the United States.
