the foreign and domestic breeds of horses, cattle and sheep in this country. He has just wintered 7,000 sheep with a loss of less than one per cent. He wintered 537 cows without feeding them, except on several cold nights with hay, with only a loss of four calves and one cow. His success in this respect is due mainly to good shelter. The secret of saving feed and preserving stock is shelter. During the past year Mr. Grant expended \$6,200 in constructing shelter, and he has such faith in its advantages that he will expend double the amount during the coming season. He had \$250,000 invested in stock, and is the owner of the thoroughbred English stallion Flodden, valued at \$25,000, father of which won the race in 1860 at Derby, in which half a million dollars changed hands. Mr. Grant has just returned from the East, and has on the way to his farm thirty odd brood mares, purchased in Ohio, Virginia and Kentucky.
