POSTMASTER APPOINTED.—Robert H. Dunlap has been appointed Postmaster of the Post Office at Hot Springs, Lake County.

FOR SALEM.—H. L. Webb left Monday for Salem, where he went as delegate to the Democratic State Convention, which met there yesterday. E. D. Foudray, Esq., also represented this county as delegate in the Convention.

A GOOD JOB.—The Odd Fellows' Hall is being renovated throughout, and will be finished ere long. It is being painted in a neat and tasty manner by J. L. Carter & Son and J. H. Hyzer, who are making a good job of it.

SURVEYORS ARRIVED.—The surveyors who are to survey the ditch the English Company (who have purchased the Galice creek placer diggings of Judge Reed and others,) propose to run, arrived from below last week, and have gone to the scene of operations. The company evidently means business.

ELECTED.—Oregonian-Pocahontas Tribe No. 1, Imp. O. R. M., of Jacksonville, this year received the honor of having one of its number elected Sachem of the Great Council for the ensuing year, in the person of John Chimborsky. This Tribe elected four delegates to the Council—all of whom attended in person.

COMING.—The celebrated Alleghenians are coming this way, and may be expected here in two or three weeks. Their performances are said to be first-class and comprise many novelties in the musical line, including the rendering of various melodies on the Swiss bells by members of the company, and on glass goblets, partially filled with water, by Prof. Benjamin, besides other interesting and amusing accomplishments. Their efforts are well spoken of by the press everywhere.

GONE TO HIS REST.—Charles Harris, a pioneer of this section died Sunday morning, and was buried the following day, Rev. J. R. N. Bell, of Ashland, holding appropriate ceremonies at the Cemetery. Charley was born in Suffolk county, Massachusetts, came to California in the year 1849 and to Jackson county in 1852, since which time he has almost continually been a resident of this place, and was about 55 years of age. He had been ailing for some time.

MINING ON ROGUE RIVER.—We learn that a company propose wingdaming Rogue river near the residence of Jos. Douden, and we also hear of another project on foot to wingdam the river a distance above the bar of the same, for the purpose of mining its bed. Several streams by which much mining has been done in former days are continually flowing into Rogue river, and there undoubtedly are good paying diggings in some portions of the bed. Chinese have for some time been mining it in places, and no doubt make it pay, judging from the assiduity with which they prosecute their labors. The successful mining of the bed of Rogue river would open a new era in our prosperity.

A couple of spiritualists are pretending to tell the people of Josephine county where good gold mines can be found.

The atmosphere north of us looks rather heavy and smoky, denoting the prevalence of fires in the woods of that vicinity.

Gen. O. O. Howard, Col. Bachelder and Lieut. Sladen, who have been at Fort Klamath, returned to Portland a few days since.

W. J. Stanley will take the Sun's Valley school next term. We learn he also intends opening a store in that section ere long.

Work has commenced in earnest on the proposed Masonic building. The sleepers have been placed in position, and the brick work is progressing.

John Hockenoy has purchased the interest of Samuel Hall in the carpentering business, which will hereafter be carried on by Smith & Hockenoy.

Wm. Bybee, Jr., arrived from Virginia City, Nev., last week, having disposed of the whole drove of hogs driven there by himself and others without trouble.

The case of the State vs. Caroline Briggs, appealed from this District to the Supreme Court, has been argued and submitted. H. K. Hanna, Esq., has received the briefs of both sides.

John Howell has sold his farm on Wagner creek to John Moreland, and has gone to San Francisco to receive treatment for deafness, with which he has been troubled some time.

The railroad party, which passed through town a short time ago, left Eugene for Goose Lake, via the O. C. M. Road, in a private conveyance Monday before last, and are now in California.

M. Caton, Chairman of the Republican County Committee, has issued a call for the County Convention, to be held in Jacksonville on Wednesday, August 4th. The primaries will come off to-morrow.

Walter F. Sutton, formerly of this place, but now of Ellensburg, Curry county, passed through the valley Tuesday, assisting a gentleman from that county in driving a band of sheep to Goose Lake.

Wages of hands in the harvest field have been reduced from \$2 a day and board, the price paid last year, to \$1.50 and board. This reduction has caused considerable dissatisfaction among the laborers.

The Independents of Oregon will hold their primaries to-morrow, 31st inst. The Independents are so few and far between in Jackson, Josephine and Lake counties, that it is extremely doubtful if any of them will be represented in the State Convention.

Since the advent of Professor Rockwell and Hurlbut, the average youngster is busily engaged in training the equine race hereabouts to imitate the performances of their ponies, and often with remarkable success. Daily exhibitions of their skill are in vogue now.

A State Temperance Convention has been called to meet in Salem on August 13th, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress. It is recommended that mass county conventions to elect delegates be held August 7th. Under this call Jackson is entitled to

five delegates, Josephine and Lake counties to one each.

Thieves are again prowling about at night, but have not committed any serious depredations as yet, though several attempts at robbery have been made. One of Madame Holt's Chinese waiters had all of his clothes stolen the other evening, while some suspicious looking persons have been seen skulking about in different localities. Look out for them.

James A. Stewart has gone to look after his stock interests in Sprague River Valley.

Quincy A. Brooks, of Lake county, arrived from Salem yesterday.

Sol. Sachs and David Cronemiller returned from Portland Tuesday, where they have been in attendance on the Great Council of the Imp. O. R. M. John Chimborsky, also a delegate, returned Wednesday.

John Miller, who has been laying in a first-class stock of goods at San Francisco, arrived home Friday last.

James A. Cardwell returned from Korbville Saturday night.

E. F. Lewis and Syl. Campbell have gone to Galice Creek.

Dr. Matthias and R. L. Ish started yesterday morning on a rusticiating trip to Fort Klamath.

Sheriff Manning arrived home Saturday from a trip to the Coast, where he has been looking after James, the person who stole a horse from Manning & Ish's livery stable some time ago. He was unable to get any trace of him.

FLATTERING REPORTS FROM JOSEPHINE.—Dr. J. B. Pilkington, President of the Oregon Quartz Mining Company lately organized at Portland, and Mr. Jay G. Kelly, Superintendent of the same, arrived from Korbville Monday and favored us with a call. From them we learn that the mill going up on their claims near Korbville will be completed in the course of two weeks, and that everything looks favorable. They brought with them some extremely rich specimens of polybasite, one of the richest of silver ores, which were found in the Siskiyou mountains in Josephine county. The gold which this ore contains makes it more valuable than pure silver of the same weight. The Doctor is very sanguine over the prospects, and expresses great confidence in the mineral resources of Jackson and Josephine, and says he intends reporting fifty claims in these counties as worthy of attention. He believes that his company have one of the richest mines on the Coast. These are certainly very flattering prospects, and coming from the source they do may be considered reliable. All that is necessary to prove that this section is one of the richest to be found anywhere is capital and labor to develop it, which will return manifold in time.

THE SAME MAN.—Wm. Franklin, who murdered his wife and then killed himself at Buena Vista, Polk county, recently, is the same person who in an early day crept down the chimney of an old German's house on Jackson creek and nearly killed the occupant thereof. It was at first thought that the German was killed, but he subsequently recovered. Franklin was arrested, narrowly escaping hanging at the time by the crowd, and afterwards was sent to the Penitentiary for the crime. He then went by the name of Isaac Tubbs, and drove a hack between this place and Sterling.

A MISTAKE.—The following news item has been going the rounds of the press:

The Albany Democrat says a sheep-shearing bee in Lake county, last week, resulted in the death of only five men; but then it must be remembered that Lake is a new county, and the people haven't got much used to these amusements.

The Democrat is greatly mistaken in the above statement. No such affair has been heard of in this section, and the authorities of Lake county would have taken prompt steps in the premises had this occurred.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, July 28th.

The Board of Trustees met this evening, pursuant to adjournment, President Beckman presiding. All the members were present except Mr. Judge.

The minutes of the two last meetings were read and approved.

The following bills against the town were ordered paid: U. S. Hayden, Recorder's bill, \$74.45; Fred. Grob, Marshal's bill, \$125.50; R. S. Dunlap, Sexton's salary, \$30; stationery, \$2.25; Sexton's bill for work in cemetery, \$23.50; J. S. Howard, surveys in cemetery, \$7.50. Total, \$263.20.

The following bills were presented: Carter & Son, painting cemetery gate, fence and railing, \$11; K. Kubli, paints and oil for cemetery, \$15; John Miller, white lead for cemetery, \$10; R. S. Dunlap, work on cemetery, \$22.50; U. S. Hayden, blanks, \$7.50; H. K. Hanna, quarterly salary, \$25. Total, \$92.

The following petition, signed by Isaac Sachs and 12 others, was received and read: "The undersigned citizens of Jacksonville would respectfully call the attention of your honorable body to an existing nuisance on Oregon street; caused by maintaining the post and railing along the sidewalk of Fisher & Caro's store, which is made the hitching and standing place for horses and mules, and as a consequence filth and manure accumulates and has accumulated there and filled up the street, making it a dirty and filthy place, causing a very offensive smell to pass by and to the residences on that street; and your petitioners ask that the nuisance be abated, and the post and railing removed."

Mr. Sachs moved that the prayer of the petition be granted, and the Street Commissioner be ordered to remove said fence and railing without unreasonable delay.

The motion prevailed, the President voting nay.

A special election was ordered to be held on Wednesday, August 11th next, to fill the vacancy in the Board of Trustees, caused by the removal from town of H. Judge. L. J. C. Duncan, R. S. Dunlap and J. R. Neil were appointed Judges, and C. W. Savage and John A. Boyer, Clerks.

Recorder ordered to give legal public notice of the election.

The Board adjourned to Wednesday, August 11th.

SUIT DECIDED.—The case of S. B. Ormstead and Henry Bixby vs. A. H. Carson et al, a suit to recover possession of the quartz claim adjoining the old Jewett ledge, in Grant's Pass precinct, was tried before Justice Schieffelin's court this week and decided in favor of defendant. Kahler & Watson appeared for plaintiff and H. K. Hanna for defendant.

RETURNED.—Dr. J. A. Callender, who left week before last for California, returned Wednesday morning, having succeeded in disposing of his turnout at a good price. The Doctor is more favorably impressed than ever with this section since his return from the State about which so much is said, but often greatly exaggerated.
