GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS. M. E. Conference meets at Salem Aug. 11th, Bishop Peck presiding. In Cuba, recently, the insurgents gained a marked success in beating the Spaniards. Rumors of a Beecher-Tilton scrape reaches the Albany Register. The plot is laid in Linn county. In Southern Ohio the people are suffering from floods, which do great damage to crops, the rain being very severe. Duncan, Sherman & Co., a large banking firm of New York, suspended last week, causing great excitement on Wall street. Harvest hands are scarce on Puget Sound; farmers are offering \$2 25 per day and board, but are unable to get laborers enough. Four counterfeiters have been arrested in New York for making and passing counterfeit trade dollars and five-dollar pieces. It is said that Brigham Young has acquired the title of general from having been called "Briggy, dear," so often by his numerous wives. Oregon and Dakota are the only wheat districts that came to the full average this year and have not been injured by drouth, rust, grasshoppers, weevils or some other pest. The New York World says Henry Ward Beecher has decided to give up his usual course of winter lectures, and will devote most of his spare time to building up the Christian Union.

THE RAILROAD. The railroad men who left for the north returned to this place from the Klamath Lake section last Monday evening at half-past 9 o'clock, and left for Soda Springs at 2 A. M. next morning. They think it no trouble to build a road easily from Reading to the State line, but consider it a great and expensive undertaking to build a road from Linkville to Roseburg, over the very rough country intervening, should they conclude to make connection with the proposed road from Winnemucca to Oregon. Colton said to a friend here, that it would be the height of his ambition to run a locomotive into Yreka. This friend asked him what interest it was for the Central Pacific to care how the Oregon line was built, or at what expense, and from the manner of the answer, it was supposed that the Central Pacific would eventually be obliged to build the road from Reading to Roseburg, in order to get one. The Central Pacific may possibly buy out the German bondholders, and it is thought the company are very anxious to have the Winnemucca road built, and probably form a connection in the Lake section from Reading. This Winnemucca road would answer the purpose of the Northern Pacific road, to a great extent, and at the same time furnish a good winter road for Eastern travel to San Francisco and Portland; in fact a better route at any time of the year, over a much lower grade than over the Sierra Nevada. The Sierra Nevada range runs down to the level plain, near the northeast corner of the State, and there are open routes all the way to the lakes, with a good connecting route down Klamath river to Shasta Valley and Reading. Besides the advantages above stated, the overland travel is becoming so great that another road is necessary to accommodate the business, and we believe the expense of operating the Winnemucca road will be consequently less than over the road via Reno and Truckee. In addition to the great benefits afforded by having a short route from Winnemucca to Portland, towards supplying the State of Oregon, Washington Territory and British Columbia, the road can be tapped in the Southern part of Idaho for the benefit of Idaho, and a large portion of Montana, more advantageously than by the present routes of travel to the principal marts of trade, and the more we examine into the merits of this Winnemucca route, the more advantageous we discover it to be for the benefit of California as well as Oregon. Efforts have been made at different times to find good practical routes at a reasonable cost, towards running a road up Pit River to the Lake country in Southern Oregon, but all such investigations along both Pit and McCloud rivers, indicate that the cheapest, most available and practical route is to come into Shasta Valley and through it to the Klamath river near Bell's ferry, and follow that stream to its source at Klamath Lake. The route from Winnemucca to Klamath Lake is seldom ever covered with more than a couple of feet of snow in the heaviest winters, which would require no snow sheds as on the route via Truckee and Reno, and as for reaching Shasta Valley from Klamath Lake, we will have wagon communication all winter along the Klamath, over the new wagon road now nearly ready for travel.—Yreka Journal.

GAVE HIS NOTE FOR HIS BRIDE.—The Albert Lee (Minn.) Standard says: "Two young men, one of them residing in the northern part of this county, and the other in the southern part of Steele county, were each enamored with the same young lady. The affections of the young lady were about equally divided between the two. Hard words and blows failed to settle the difficulty. As a last resort, the Freeborn county man agreed to relinquish all his right and title to the fair damsel for the sum of \$100. The other chap refused, and Freeborn county showed a willingness to do the fair thing, by then offering to give \$100 and take the disputed property himself. Steele county scorned the offer. One hundred and fifty dollars failed to reach him, but when the bid was raised to \$160 it proved too much for his cupidity, and with eagerness he cried out, 'Take her!' A USE FOR BEDBUGS.—A correspondent of the Scientific American says: "If nice fat bedbugs are placed in a saturated solution of nitrate of potash in water, and exposed to the air for several days in an open vessel, there will be no apparent change in the bugs; but there will be in the odor, for now it is as delicate and delicious as before it was rank and disgusting. No doubt the odorous principle could be easily separated, perhaps by digesting with alcohol or ether; and if neatly bottled and labeled, it would yield a large profit to practical perfumers. The odor is unlike that of any other perfume I have ever smelt, and no one would suspect its low origin. This is one use for the *emex*; there may be others.

THE SUPREME COURT has just affirmed the decision of Judge Shattuck in the case of Doland vs. Barnard, deciding that the act of 1874, limiting the assessment of any person on account of his indebtedness within this State to \$1,000 is unconstitutional and void, for the reason that it does not comply with Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State. The result is that every person has the right to deduct his entire indebtedness, as heretofore. It would be well for persons interested to attend the meeting of the Board of Equalization.

THE TARGET.—Having heard numerous inquiries in relation to the size of the target used at the late shooting match between the Irish and American riflemen, we herewith give its dimensions as a matter of local interest: The whole target was 6x12 feet; the center, 6x6 feet; the bull's-eye, 3x3 feet. The ranges were eight hundred, nine hundred and one thousand yards, and each man was allowed fifteen shots for each respective. A shot in the bull's-eye scored 4; in the center, 3; in any part of the target, 2. Sixty would therefore be the highest possible score, and the whole fifteen shots would have to strike the bull's-eye.
