### Eastern Elections.

The Democracy is entering into the Congressional campaign with energy and under encouraging circumstances. Ratification meetings have been held at Salem and Albany, which were largely attended and much enthusiasm manifested. Hon. L. F. Lane, Hon. Ben. Hayden, Hon. J. H. Slater, Gov. Grover and others addressed the meeting at Silem, while Messrs. Lane, Grover, Helm, Gearin, of Multnomah, Hazard, of Coos, spoke at Albany. Mr. Lane acquitted himself admirably, and the Albany Democrat says his "efforts surprised and gratified his friends, who scarcely expected he would be able to acquit himself in so very able and creditable a manner." Hon. J. H. Slater also addressed a large audience at Oregon City on the 3d. It is rarely that as much interest and enthusiasm is displayed in any election as is manifested by the Democracy in this one.

# Could not Agree.

The jury in the case of John D. Lee, on trial in the U. S. District Court at Salt Lake City for his connection with the Mountain Meadow Massacre, could not agree, have been discharged and the trial continued for the term. The evidence adduced shows the commission of a brutal and terrible massacre, one of the darkest on record. The testimony of some witnesses implicates Brigham Young, while that of others attempts to shield him. The jury stood from beginning nine for acquittal, two for conviction, and one ready to go either way. All the Mormons and one Gentile were wavering, and two Gentiles for conviction. Justice should be fully meted to all the participants in the massacre, let the expense be what it may.

# A Strong Nomination.

The nomination of Hon. L. F. Lane is no doubt one of the strongest that could have been made. From every portion of the State we learn that the greatest satisfaction prevails in Democratic ranks, and he will receive a cordial support. 1. Unfaltering devotion to the cardinal principles of republican government, as declared and put into practical operation by holder. the Fathers of the Republic.

2. The preservation of the general gover:1ment in the proper exercise of the powers delegated to it in the Constitution, carefully and strictly construed, and the maintenance, inviolate, of the several States of the Union in all their rights, dignity and equality, as the most competent and reliable administrators of their own domestic concerns, and the surest bulwark against the tendency towards a centralized despotism.

3. Opposition to aggressions by either department of the Government, upon the formation of the and to the exercise of federal authority of any of the rights or powers assured by the Constitution to the States respectively, or to the people.

4. That every attempt on the part of the Federal Government to exercise any powers not delegated to it, and especially every interference by the Government or any of its departments, with the local affairs of In the Circuit Court for the County of Jackany State, or with the rights of the people thereof to choose their own representatives, is an act of usurpation which should be repudiated and condemned by every friend of constitutional liberty.

5. # Tax Law Decision.

The last Legislature passed an amendment to the assessment law, exempting only one thousand dollars of indebtedness to each tax payer. The constitutionality of this law was tested in the action of W. P. Doland vs. O. M. Barnard, Assessor of Multnomah county, in the Multnomah Circuit Court. This case was a proceeding for a writ CHEAP FOR THE CASH. of mandamus to compel the Assessor to deduct from the aggregate value of property the full amount of indebtedness within the State. Mr. Doland gained his suit, and the law was declared unconstitutional, and therefore void. The Supreme Court affirmed this decision, on an appeal from that county. The Salem Mercury thus

refers to the matter: The ruling of both the lower and the higher Court is that the amendatory act of 1874 is null and void, in that it does not conform to the constitutional provision relating to the proper form in which amendatory laws Art. 4 of the State constitution. And the ! teed.
