Very Strange.

Some time since, Hon. L. F. Lane sent Messrs. Whitney and Warren, the Independent and Republican nominees, an invitation to canvass the State with him. Mr. Whitney responded immediately, in a courteous manner accepting; but nothing was heard from Mr. Warren until several days afterwards, when he answered in the affirmative, stating that his failure in replying sooner was owing to the fact that he had just received Mr. Lane's invitation. On looking over the Yamhill Reporter, Mr. Warren's local organ, we see reference made to this very letter of Mr. Lane some days prior to the date of Warren's reply. Now, it is evident that he either prevaricates in the premises, or the editor of the Reporter is guilty of taking unpardonable privileges with Mr. Warren's mail matter. But, then, we can hardly blame Warren for being averse to taking the stump.

Sheridan Coming.

Gen. P. H. Sheridan is now on this Coast on a visit, and upon the invitation of Gen. O. O. Howard is expected to visit Portland very soon. Phil. used to be stationed in Oregon at an early day, and on his exit from this State left several young Sheridans behind, some of which now reside in this county. He will doubtless be received with much ceremony by the military, and the authorities of Portland are also making preparations for his reception.

A United Support.

We have never known of a political campaign where the Democratic press was more united and harmonious than in the present. Every Democratic journal in the State from Baker City to Jacksonville, says the Mercury, is working with a will for the triumphant election of Hon. L. F. Lane. "In unity there is strength." This union on the part of the press speaks volumes for the popularity of a candidate and will tell on election day by his triumphant election to the Halls of Congress.

Now and Then.

The School Fund, since the Democratic administration came into power in this State, has increased nearly a quarter of a million of dollars, and is steadily swelling and becoming larger and larger. While Woods was Governor, not a dollar of the interest on the irreducible school fund was distributed towards the support of free schools; but a large amount was lost by loaning these funds to irresponsible party favorites.

More Candidates.

Although there are already four candidates in the field, two more have come to the surface in the persons of H. N. Pike, of Benton county, and Sam W. McDowell, of Salem. The Oregonian, which is beating about the political arena without a candidate, surely cannot complain as regards number.

THE OHIO DEMOCRACY ON INFLATION.

The Republican press, especially of this State, is raising a hue and cry over the financial plank in the Ohio Democratic platform, and by asserting that it pronounces in favor of unlimited inflation seeks to prejudice the voters of other sections. Any one who has read that resolution of the Ohio Democracy and understands the situation in that State, will readily see that it favors nothing of the kind, the following being a true copy of the same:

"That the contraction of the currency heretofore made by the Republican party, and the further contraction proposed by it, with a view to the forced resumption of specie payments, have already brought disaster to the business interests of the country, and threaten it with general bankruptcy and ruin. We demand that this policy be abandoned, and that the volume of currency be made and kept equal to the wants of trade, leaving the restoration of legal tenders to a par with gold to be brought about by promoting the industries of the people, and not by destroying them."

This plank is an expression of the Democracy of Ohio in the present State campaign, and such is its popularity that it is generally conceded by well informed members of all parties that a large majority will be given the party that adopted it. Senator Thurman, Hon. Geo. P. Pugh and the leading members of the Democratic party of Ohio, are pronounced enemies of inflation, yet they are stumping the State for their ticket. Even Hon. Geo. H. Pendleton, who has the reputation of being endowed with queer and ultra greenback ideas, is quoted as saying that he is averse to being considered in favor of inflation. Even if this resolution does promulgate principles of inflation, it does not by any means follow that the party elsewhere favors the same, especially when an unmistakable hard money resolution is adopted by its Convention as has been the case in every State where the Democracy has met.

Result of Democratic Rule.

Another of the beneficent consequences of restoring the Democratic party to power is given by the New York Bulletin, a commercial organ, as follows:

But recently we had the pleasure of noting that one of the hitherto defaulting Southern States had made provision for meeting its July interest. The State was Arkansas, which is fast redeeming its credit and recovering its prosperity under its new and popular regime. The telegraph announces that another of the delinquent Southern States has already begun paying the July interest on its new consolidated bonds. This is one of the first fruits, as in Arkansas, of the new administration of the Government of this State, in which the people have but recently secured a voice. No better results are needed to vindicate the South in its right of self-government, and no further comment is needed to characterize the former management of its affairs. In view of these facts, and the renewed vigor and prosperity of these States for the current season, it may safely be concluded that the present is the only road to the full return of prosperity, redemption of credit and honest government in the South.

Mr. Lane on Free Schools.

The Republican papers in the present campaign seem to raise up men of straw and then knock them down. They have charged Mr. Lane as being opposed to free schools and general education before he has made any declaration that he was. But all his former life and speeches are directly the reverse of the charges made by the Radicals and give the lie to them. Mr. Lane at the ratification meeting the other evening, says the Salem Mercury, said that he was in favor of and supported free schools. That he paid his taxes for their support and that his children were receiving instruction in a free school, or a school supported by taxation and interest from the common school fund. These uncalled for attacks on Mr. Lane before he gives cause for them will but work for his advantage and will before the campaign is ended turn to plague the inventors.

A Richmond in the Field.

The Custom House Ring papers announce that their candidate for Congress, Henry Warren, will enter the political arena and meet Messrs. Lane and Whitney at this place. The Portland Journal, usually well posted, learns that Warren's speech is the production of H. W. Scott, Custom House Collector. Mr. Warren addressed a small audience at Portland on Monday evening, which meeting is not very favorably spoken of by even the Ring organs. He may worry the campaign through, but his opponents will evidently use him up in the most approved manner.

BANK OF CALIFORNIA SUSPENDED.

The news of the failure of the Bank of California created quite an excitement even in Jacksonville, where few, if any, lose by the suspension. The bank has ever been considered the most substantial and reliable on the Coast, and we cannot wonder at the intense excitement its suspension caused in New York, San Francisco and other cities, where it transacted an immense business. No definite reason of its failure has yet been ventured, though several have been announced. One thing evident is, that it has often gone beyond the legitimate business of a first-class bank, dabbled in stocks, etc., which may be considered the prime cause of its misfortune. Other industries directly, and some indirectly connected with it; will necessarily suffer; but their embarrassment will in most cases not be serious. Only one other bank has also suspended, the National Gold Bank, which will without doubt again resume in a few days. No statement of the affairs of the Bank of California has been issued as yet. Some believe that it will resume and pay in full, while others deem it a dubious matter.

One thing connected with the failure will be the cause of general regret; and that is the death of Wm. C. Ralston, President of the Bank, than whom none did more for San Francisco than him. Being called on to resign his position, his sensitive nature could not withstand the shock, and he succumbed to the powers that be. Some believe that he drowned himself, but several doctors argue that he died from a stroke of apoplexy while bathing. His funeral was the most imposing and largest that ever occurred in San Francisco, 20,000 persons being in attendance.

Very Likely.

The Sentinel says that Warren is the people's candidate, and a man well qualified to represent the people in Congress. "People's candidate" is decidedly rich, especially when we consider the fact that he was put up for that office through the machinations of Hipple, Scott, Simpson & Co. Our contemporary flatters Warren very much when speaking in such glowing terms of his qualifications for Congress. Those intimately acquainted with him are, not so complimentary, knowing full well that he lacks a great deal in making even a fair Congressman. The Lafayette Courier, his home paper, speaking of him, says:

He has a very defective education, and when he was first elected Sheriff he could not write a sentence grammatically. When in the Legislature in 1864 he was a mere dummy, and was afraid to open his mouth lest he would betray his ignorance. And today he cannot make a public speech or express his views in a public audience with any facility. The Bulletin says he will make an "effective canvass." If he makes any canvass it may be effective in losing him hundreds of votes in each county. The Republican party is hard up when it places before the people, for Congress, such a man as Warren. Imagine him in Congress in the presence of such statesmen as Alex. H. Stephens, M. C. Kerr, Sunset Cox and others, debating some matter in which Oregon is deeply interested, and you have a picture of a pigmy contending with giants.

The people will never submit to the disgrace of electing Warren to Congress. The Republicans have committed a great error in placing him before the people. We ask the people to try Warren by the Jeffersonian test, "Is he honest, is he capable?" He may pass the first question, but he can not come up to the second. He is not capable. He is destined to be consigned to oblivion along with honest H. Smith. Their qualifications are the same.

GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

Immigrants still crowding into Oregon. The presses of the Albany Democrat are now run by water-power. Idaho mines have turned out a very large amount of gold this season, and mining men there feel much encouraged. It is estimated that Oregon will have five million bushels of grain for export this year. And a Democratic Congressman besides. A postal correspondent from St. Charles, Ill., in the vicinity of Bellevue Asylum, says Mrs. Lincoln is pronounced well enough to leave the asylum and visit her sister, Mrs. Edwards of Springfield. It is not likely she will return. The harvesting of wheat and early oats is well along in the Willamette now, and with few exceptions farmers are jubilant over the yield and quality of their grain. Prices range high, both for wheat and oats, and the honest farmer feels a just degree of pride in our country and of hope for its future. The Record says the population of Coos county has more than doubled, and the number of business houses have increased fourfold within the last 18 months. The mill facilities, however, are but little better than they were five years ago. There is a pressing necessity, therefore, for a daily mail from the bay to Roseburg.

Accorded Christian Burial.

By order of General Howard, the following letter has been written to the commanding officer at Fort Klamath in relation to the disinterment of the remains of those who lost their lives in the famous lava beds during the Modoc war, the conveying of the same to the fort and according to them a Christian burial in the cemetery at the post. Brief mention has been made of the order, but we publish the letter in full:

PORTLAND, Oregon, Aug. 5, 1875. To the Commanding Officer, Fort Klamath.—Sir: Referring to your post orders No. 51, paragraph 2, July 8, 1875, detailing a detachment of one commissioned officer and six enlisted men to proceed to the lava beds to examine into the condition of the graves of the dead buried there, the department commander directs you will send out a party and disinter the remains of the officers and enlisted men buried at the foot of the bluff near Gen. Gillem's old camp; also gather together the remains that can be found in and around the sandy butte where Captain Thomas' fight took place, and have them conveyed to Fort Klamath and buried in the post cemetery. A rude monument of rocks and stone will be erected at both places to designate the spots; and in this connection your attention is invited to a communication from these headquarters dated August 29, 1873, to General Wheaton on this subject.

The party will also enlarge by the addition of rocks the monument erected to the memory of General Canby. See enclosed memorandum as to spot where it is located.
