GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

J. W. Virtue, the suspended banker of Baker City, has resumed. Senator Bayard's friends are very active in the presentation of his claims to the Democratic Presidential nomination.

The British government proposes to send her fleet in Chinese waters and get satisfaction from the Mongolians for various wrongs done her.

Bill Higgins, the corrupt Superintendent of Public Buildings at Portland, has been superseded by Judge Denny, another of the Custom House Ring.

We haven't heard a word from the Radicals since our last week's publication of Lane's position on the school question. They are completely swamped on that line.

California exported during the last fiscal year goods and bullion to the amount of \$33,569,156, being a heavier amount of exports than any State in the Union, with the exception of New York and Louisiana.

It is estimated that the child population between the ages of six and sixteen in the United States and Territories is about 10,238,000, and that about 300,000 teachers are needed to educate this host of future citizens.

Senator Sharon has tendered to Mrs. Ralston, widow of the late W. C. Ralston, a suite of seven rooms in the Palast Hotel, with private servants, a private coach, and coachman, so long as she may see fit to use them.

A dispatch from Columbus, Ohio, refers to one of Secretary Delano's reasons for resigning—the exhausting labor which fidelity to his duties demanded—and says he is a conspicuous illustration of absenteeism, having been on duty only forty-two per cent. of his term of office.

A seat in the English Parliament is an expensive luxury, which no poor man, whatever his talents or capacity for public service, can afford. No salary or emoluments attach to the position, and all the necessary and legitimate expenses of the elections are borne by the candidates.

A dispatch from Rome states that Cardinal McCloskey took possession of his title in the Church of Santa Maria Supra Minervium, September 30th, with all the imposing ceremonies due such an event, there being an immense crowd present.

The race mare Trifle, owned by Geo. Ross, formerly of this place, was injured recently on the La Grande, Union county, track. As her trainer was leading her around the track, she became frightened at some object on the outside of the enclosure and jerked loose, and by some means got both hind feet entangled in the bridle reins.

Parties who have arrived at Cincinnati from Indianola, Texas, and who were there during the terrible cyclone, confirm fully even the most extravagant reports of the destruction of life and property.

THE MARE LULU.

The statement is now received from what appears to be a reliable source, that Governor Stanford has purchased the trotting mare Lulu, with the design of taking her to California.

The withdrawal of Goldsmith Maid, in consequence of age and disablement, Lulu is the acknowledged Queen of the American turf, and is still more justly entitled to that distinction from the fact of her having defeated the Maid in one of the last races trotted by that famous flyer.

Lulu first gained public attention at Muscatine, Iowa, where she was owned by Sherman Perry, under the name of Jennie Perry, and was driven by that gentleman. She made a record in her first season of 2:27 1/2, on a half-mile track.

She was sent to Kentucky and placed in the hands of Col. Richard West, of Edge Hill, and was then purchased by E. Harker, of the Everett House Stables, in 1871, for \$20,000, and from Mr. Harker she has now been purchased by ex-Governor Stanford.

At Buffalo, in 1872, she trotted second to Fullerton, who won in three straight heats in 2:25, 2:24 1/2, 2:23 1/2. At Utica, the same month, she made a record of 2:23 1/2 in the first heat, being distanced in the second by Fullerton.

THE VATICAN.

This word is often used, but many do not understand its import. The terms refers to a collection of buildings on one of the seven hills of Rome, which cover a space of 1,200 feet in length and 1,000 feet in breadth.

About the year 1100, Pope Eugenius rebuilt it on a magnificent scale. Innocent II. gave it up as a lodging to Peter II, King of Arragon. In 1305, Clement V., at the instigation of the King of France, removed the Papal See from Rome to Avignon, when the Vatican remained in a condition of obscurity and neglect for more than seventy years.

But soon after the return of the Pontifical Court to Rome, an event which had been so earnestly prayed for by Petrarch, and which finally took place in 1376, the Vatican was put into a state of repair, again enlarged, and it was thereafter considered the regular palace of the Popes, who, one after another, added fresh buildings to it, and gradually encircled it with antiquities, statues, pictures, books, etc., until it became the richest depository in the world.

The library of the Vatican was commenced 1400 years ago, and contains 40,000 manuscripts, among which are many Hebrew, Syrian, Arabian and Armenian Bibles.

The whole of the immense buildings composing the Vatican are filled with statues found beneath the ruins of ancient Rome; with paintings by the masters, and with curious medals and antiquities of every description.

When it is known that there have been exhumed more than 70,000 statues from the ruined temples and palaces of Rome, the reader can form some idea of the richness of the Vatican.—Occident.

A METAL worth \$3,000 per pound! Who ever heard of the like before? It is called Tellurium. Prof. W. F. Stewart published a communication in the Virginia City papers, calling attention of miners to its presence there.

"Long since, professor Kustel and other eminent chemists decided that the ores of the Comstock are essentially a telluride of gold and silver, and it is reasonable to expect a small quantity of the precious metal tellurium will be discovered in our mines.

This ultra-precious ore is as likely to be discovered in the mines of the Northwest Coast as Washoe, and it might be well worth while for the miners up this way to pay some attention to the processes of discovering and extracting this marvelous metal.
