## GUARD THINE ACTION.

**THE ARMED STRENGTH OF EUROPE.**—A lecture was recently delivered before the Royal United Service Institution, London, in which a British officer gave a detailed account of the standing armies and reserves of all the nations of Europe. He said that, looking at the armies of Europe from every point of view, the rapidity with which they can be mobilized, fed from reserves, concentrated on any spot and maintained on the field, he should divide them into three classes, in the order of their strength. The first class comprised Germany, Austria, Russia and France; the second, Italy and England; the third, Belgium, Turkey, Sweden and Norway, Holland, Denmark, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland and Greece. There are four armies of the first class, two of the second, and nine of the third, with, in round numbers, a strength on paper of 6,500,000 men and a combatant strength of 5,000,000, with 15,000 guns and 1,250,000 horses. In navies, Great Britain is supreme, and then come in order of strength, France, Russia, Turkey, Austria, Germany, Italy, Spain, Holland, Denmark, Sweden and Norway and Portugal. The navies of all these have an aggregate of 2,039 vessels, of which 209 are iron-clad, the whole being manned with 280,000 men and armed with 15,000 cannons. One hundred and ten ships of war are now being built, and of these fifty-six will be armor-plated. The expenses of these forces amount, according to this lecturer's estimates, to \$560,000,000 per annum, of which three-fifths go to the land forces. The armaments of Turkey and Austria cost only about \$150 a year per man; that of Great Britain at the most \$500 a year.

**KEEPING APPLES THROUGH THE WINTER.**—Alex. Hyde, a well known agriculturist of Massachusetts, communicates to the N. Y. Times some useful suggestions in regard to keeping apples through the winter. One method is to wrap each apple in a bit of old newspaper, the paper serving both to keep out the air and to prevent the apples from bruising in transportation. A method more effectual still is to fill the barrels almost full of apples and then put in some dry fine sand or plaster and shake it down gently. This will fill up all the interstices between the apples and keep them indefinitely. Another mode is to pit the apples in some dry, sandy or gravelly soil, just as turnips and potatoes are pitted. On this point Mr. Hyde says: "They will keep in a splendid manner through the winter thus pitted, but must be used speedily in the Spring after being dug out, as they will rot soon after exposure to light and air. In order to pit apples select some dry spot where there is no danger of water filling the pit, and dig a hole three or four feet deep and of any required size, place some clean dry straw on the bottom, and on this the apples, to the depth of two feet, covering the whole with a layer of straw and then a layer of dry earth, raising the latter above the general level of the ground and sloping it off roof-fashion, so that it will shed rain. The apples will come out in the Spring as crisp as cabbages pitted in this way."

**POLITICAL ORATORS IN THE WEST** indulge in some high-flown asseverations in regard to their firmness of principle. The following is a moderate specimen: "Build a worm fence around the Winter's supply of Summer weather, skim the clouds from the sky with a teaspoon, catch a thunder-cloud in a bladder, break a hurricane to harness, ground sluice an earthquake, lasso an avalanche, pin a napkin on the crater of an active volcano—but never expect to see me false to my principles."

**A YANKEE** has invented a milking machine that can be carried in a pocket-book. Now, if he were to invent a milch cow that could be carried in the coat-tail pocket, his machines would sell more rapidly.

If you have been picking or handling any acid fruit, and have stained your hands, wash them in clear water, wipe them lightly, and while they are yet moist strike a match and shut your hands around it so as to catch the smoke, and the stains will disappear. If you have stained your muslin or gingham dress, or your white pants, with berries, before wetting with anything else pour boiling water through the stains and they will disappear. Before fruit juice dries, it can often be removed by cold water, using a sponge and towel, if necessary. Rubbing the fingers with the inside of the parings of apples will remove most of the stain caused by paring.

**THE RICHEST WOMAN IN AMERICA.**—The will of Robert H. Ives, of Providence, is a great surprise and disappointment to almost everybody. It was universally expected that he would leave large sums to various public institutions, Brown University especially hoping to come in for a big slice; but beyond bequests not exceeding \$200,000, he leaves his vast fortune to his only daughter, wife of Prof. W. B. Gammell, formerly of Brown University, who is now the richest woman in America, having an income of at least a million a year. Mr. Ives' estate is estimated at about \$20,000,000.

"BOSTON babies are weaned early and fed on fish," says the Brooklyn Argus. They accumulate much phosphorus. ## DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

The Democratic party of Oregon, in State Convention assembled, proclaims the following propositions of political faith and action:

1. Unflinching devotion to the cardinal principles of republican government, as declared and put into practical operation by the Fathers of the Republic.  
2. The preservation of the general government in the proper exercise of the powers delegated to it in the Constitution, carefully and strictly construed, and the maintenance, inviolate, of the several States of the Union in all their rights, dignity and equality, as the most competent and reliable administrators of their own domestic concerns, and the surest bulwark against the tendency towards a centralized despotism.  
3. Opposition to aggression by either department of the Government, upon the formation of the and to the exercise of federal authority of any of the rights or powers assured by the Constitution to the States respectively, or to the people.

4. That every attempt on the part of the Federal Government to exercise any powers not delegated to it, and especially every interference by the Government or any of its departments, with the local affairs of any State, or with the rights of the people thereof to choose their own representatives, is an act of usurpation which should be repudiated and condemned by every friend of constitutional liberty.

5. We demand retrenchment, reform, and the most rigid economy in the administration of every department of the Government; the honest payment of the debts, the sacred preservation of the public faith; strict accountability of all officers, and the speedy and impartial arraignment of all abuses of public trust before the tribunals of justice; a zealous care of the rights of election by the people; the absolute subordination of the military to the civil authority. The equal and impartial administration of the laws, and the protection of the press of all; freedom of religions, of the rights, and of the person under protection of the habeas corpus, and trial by jury impartially selected.  
6. We protest against the burdens of a protective tariff, as needless exactions from a people already intolerably oppressed by a national debt, and we insist that the tariff be so regulated as to provide only sufficient revenue for an economical administration of the Government, and not for the purpose of enriching the few at the expense of the many, or fostering one branch of industry to the detriment of the other.

7. That the precious metals are the only basis of commercial values; that an irredeemable paper currency is a national curse, and we insist upon the speedy return by the National Government to specie payments.

8. The institution of the system of national banks was a fraud upon the country, and an injustice upon the laboring classes, and we demand such prudent legislation as will gradually bring this vicious system to a close; that all currency which may be issued shall be convertible into gold on demand and be issued directly by the Government.

9. That the treaty between the United States and China was a fraud upon the country, and an injustice upon the laboring classes, and we demand such prudent legislation as will gradually bring this vicious system to a close; that all currency which may be issued shall be convertible into gold on demand and be issued directly by the Government.

10. That we condemn the party in power, not only for its contempt of constitutional obligations, but for its reckless expenditure and profligate waste of the people's money; for its oppressive, unjust and detective system of taxation; for the perversion of the functions of the General Government to enrich the great corporations at the expense of the people; for the jobbery and frauds which have brought reproach upon democratic institutions; for the injury of the protective system; for the curse of an inconvertible paper money; for its disgraceful diplomatic service and unfit appointments and continuance in office of incompetent and corrupt men at home and abroad; for its attempt to pass an unconstitutional force bill, and for a catalogue of other enormities which have rendered that organization offensive to and subversive of the liberties of a free people.

11. That corporations are the creatures of law; their functions and privileges are granted by statute; and when they are not for the object of their creation, but for purpose of oppression and extortion, we declare it to be the right and duty of the legislative power to regulate and control such corporations for the public good.  
12. That we disapprove all measures in the interest of monopolies against labor, and therefore we approve of the declared principles and sympathize with the avowed objects of the order known as the Patrons of Husbandry, and with those of all other orders having for their object retrenchment and reform in public affairs, and the social advancement of the people.

13. That we are in favor of laboring to secure the judicious appropriations from Congress for the improvement of the navigation, and for the free navigation and improvement of our State, and we demand that our Representatives in Congress shall use their best efforts to secure the aid of the General Government for the free navigation and improvement of the Columbia river, by the construction of locks at the Cascades; the improvement of the Willamette and Coquille rivers; the construction of the Portland, Dalles and Salt Lake and Winnemucca Railroads, and the early completion of the Oregon and California Railroad from Roseburg to the State line.

14. That the policy of the Republican party in dealing with the Indian tribes is impolitic and unwise; that the time has arrived when the few Indians now occupying the lands of the United States, and whose reservations should be removed to some other locality, and thus open up to settlement by the whites some of the richest portions of the State.

15. That we invite the hearty co-operation of all persons, whatever may have been their past political affiliations, to unite with us in carrying out the principles herein enunciated.
