GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

W. R. Lewis, a stage driver at New Westminster, won the \$5,000 in the Seattle gold coin lottery, holding ticket 818.

During his absence from this State, A. J. Dufur's address will be "Centennial Room No. 904, Walnut street, Philadelphia."

From what information we can gather, there are cattle buyers now in Umatilla county commanding a capital of not less than \$50,000.

An inexhaustible mine of white-wash was recently discovered in Missouri. If the Republican party don't want it all they might lend Plymouth Church a painful or two.

The investigating committees are so busily engaged barrowing and unearthing around the National Capital, that it is thought that the foundation of the White House will seriously suffer.

By an order from the Secretary of War, Major Virgil S. Eggleston, a defaulting Paymaster from this Department, has been released from confinement in the Albany, New York, Penitentiary.

Seventy dollars is the sum now offered by the Hillsboro, Washington county, wolf club for every wolf killed within its bounds, or started in and killed without the bounds, from now until the 1st of May next.

The Independent says: In the matter of the County Assessor, J. A. Flipper, vs. Washington county, a suit for mileage, Judge Shattuck has decided that the Assessor is entitled to mileage in addition to his \$3 per day.

The pen with which the President signed the bill appropriating \$1,500,000 to the Centennial was made from the quill of an American eagle shot in the vicinity of Mount Hope, Oregon. The pen and eagle will be exhibited at the Centennial.

The movement on the Chinese question is already beginning to bear the proper kind of fruit in San Francisco. Eckstein Bros., shoe manufacturers, have determined to do away with Chinese labor in their factory as fast as they possibly can and substitute white labor instead.

A few years ago U. S. Grant, John Sherman, James G. Blaine and John A. Logan were all poor men. Some of them poor devils, yet on very small salaries they have lived high and become millionaires. What is true of these gentlemen is also true of a large majority of the Republican office-holders.

J. M. Bacon, Grand Secretary, has made arrangements with the various lines of transportation to convey delegates attending the session of the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., to be held at Salem May 16th. The usual terms have been made—fall fare going, and returning on certificates from Grand Secretary.

E. M. Waite, Secretary of the State Agricultural Society, has received a quantity of garden seeds, wheat, barley, sugar beets, Kentucky blue grass, etc., for distribution to those complying with the requirements of the Department of Agriculture at Washington. Those desirous of trying these seeds will address E. M. Waite, Salem.

E. M. Waite, Secretary of the Oregon State Agricultural Society, has received four entries for the Post Stake for running two-year-olds at the State Fair for 1876, and one for the trotting premium. The premiums offered by the Society for these races are \$500, and open only for colts and fillies bred in Oregon. The entries for these premiums close May 1st.

The Portland (Maine) Press gets an item of political information from its New York correspondent which is certainly important—if it proves true: "One thing may be set down as a certainty. No Republican who is an enemy of the Administration can be elected President. Whatever else the Cincinnati Convention may do, it may be trusted not to present a candidate who has ever whined and sniveled about the corruption and frauds of his party."

The proceedings of the National Colored Convention at Nashville, on the 6th, were unimportant, except two speeches from Pinchback and Smith, of Alabama. Pinchback said the colored people were beginning to think for themselves and would never again vote the Republican ticket in solid columns as heretofore. Senator C. S. Smith made a powerful speech in favor of the blacks no longer to remain with the Republican party, but make terms with their white Southern friends and hereafter vote for honest men, for competent men, without reference to party. The speech made a profound impression and was received with great applause.

TO THE PUBLIC OF THE PACIFIC COAST.

The Committee appointed by the Public Authorities of the city of San Francisco to take into consideration the evil of Chinese immigration and matters of relief pertinent thereto, believe that every substantial interest of the people of the Pacific Coast is jeopardized by that unrestricted immigration; that the time is approaching when, if the evil continues unchecked, they will find themselves driven from their vocations and thrust from their firesides by the increasing immigration flowing from China; that the evil has already grown to such proportion as to endanger the public peace and to imperil the security of life; and by recent advices from China we are informed that the exodus from there is truly alarming—there being now on the way and soon to land upon our shores upward of four thousand—and that efforts are being made to charter every available vessel in the Chinese waters to bring here their cargoes of Coolies; and that the evil, steadily growing to more and more alarming proportions, threatens not only the peace and prosperity of the Pacific Coast, but, ultimately, the best interests of the whole country. The Committee also appreciate that the only adequate relief for this vast and overshadowing evil is to be had through the interposition of National Government, brought about by such earnest expression of public opinion from all parts of the Pacific Coast as will carry to Washington a conviction of the imperative necessity of the relief demanded.

The Committee, therefore, in discharge of the duties committed to them, urgently recommend that the people in every town, village and hamlet throughout the coast move in co-operation in their respective districts to give early expression of their feelings on this subject, by the passage of suitable resolutions, to be forwarded without delay to this Committee.

The interior papers favorable to this movement will aid the cause by publishing this appeal.

Farmers and their families, as well as everybody else, like honey, and every farmer should keep a few stands of bees to supply his table with the luxury that few can enjoy who do not keep bees. Bees are not expensive to buy or to keep; they generally provide their own food, and have a good surplus for your table, and with a little extra care may be made profitable. And in these times of adulteration, when the syrups of commerce are made of poison, it is a matter of importance to every farmer to supply his family with syrup of honey, gathered pure from the flowers of his fields.—Western Agriculturist.

ROTATION OF CROPS.—As desirable as rotation in office may be, it cannot be more so than a judicious rotation of crops raised on the farm. No matter how fertile the soil, it is conceded that constant cropping with one, two or three kinds of grain wears out the land. All good farmers concede that a proper rotation of crops, including the grasses, should be followed. Chemists inform us that the nutriment of food-producing plants is taken in part from the soil in solution from the roots, and partly from the air through the leaves, and therefore that suitable food must be provided, or a manifest deterioration will result. The good farmer, while he aims to produce the largest crops at the least expense, will also be careful to keep up the fertility of the soil by a judicious rotation of crops, supplemented by the application of manures to the land.—Rural World.
