

GALICE CREEK.—From a private letter received by a lady in Yreka, from the Galice Creek mines in Oregon, the Journal extracts the following in reference to that mining district:

Concerning the mines here, they are all turning out well. The English Company have completed their ditch; and have hydraulics running on both sets of their diggings, and are getting large returns for their labor. The Courtney gravel mines are also paying excellent this Winter and Spring. It is now a settled fact that there is a very extensive country here that will pay well, with good hydraulics, fully equal if not superior to the gravel mines of your State. I would also state that there is no longer a doubt about the silver mines being good. An assayer from Nevada came here lately, who stopped three weeks, and was so well pleased with his prospects that he bought an interest in the Yank, started to Roseburg, to be back in three weeks to go to work. Galice Creek is getting to be a lively mining camp. The two companies owning the rich gold quartz mines, 5 miles below, will both commence working their claims soon. A consolidated company, formed for the purpose of working gravel claims on the north side of Rogue river, are now constructing a ditch, to be completed by the 1st of July. Mr. Bybee, of Jacksonville, is one of the principal men concerned in it. It is on the same range of the English Co.'s mines, and prospects full as well. The range of gravel has been traced clear through and beyond Grave Creek, and prospects well wherever tried, for a distance of 25 miles.

EDUCATION AND VAGRANCY.—Does education produce genteel vagrants? Those opposed to a practical system of education are constantly warning people of the danger of educating people above their station in life, and are always ready to point to the swindlers and forgers as the product of schooling. To say the least, it is monstrous arrogance in anybody in this country to try to confine a child to any one station in life, or to determine what his station shall be. It is false, too, to assume that the dangerous classes are educated to any considerable degree. Disinclination to study drives many boys out of school. How much this disinclination is the result of our enemies' teachings, of the contempt in which they hold the policy of educating the masses, and consequent contempt in which education is held; how much ignorance and vagrancy grow out of such doctrines, we dare not say, lest we appear to usurp the office of Deity in fixing the measure of men's iniquity. In monarchical countries where the people are held by force, and trained to labor *utens volens*, there may be produced the phenomena of an ignorant, industrious populace. But in this land of liberty and latitude, it is only by a considerable amount of mental cultivation that habits of industry and consequent honesty are formed. The industrious student makes the industrious merchant or mechanic; the truant is apt to be the stuff of which the scamp is manufactured.

FEARFUL ESTIMATE.—The New York Bulletin, a journal especially valued as financial authority, makes a fearful summary of the results of Radical rule in the following words and figures:

"After allowing for the inevitable addition to taxes arising from war expenditures, it may be safely estimated that for the last ten years the taxes, including all kinds, have been swelled by corrupt political influences at the rate of \$250,000,000 a year. If this estimate be correct we have paid within one decade \$2,500,000,000—an amount sufficient to extinguish the whole national debt and equal to four years' net earnings of the nation—as the penalty of tolerating political corruption."

This estimate, embracing as it does, taxes of all kinds, Federal, State, County and Municipal, can hardly be in excess of the facts. It is not surprising, therefore, that the cry of "hard times" goes up in all parts of the country. The only wonder is, that the country has been able to bear such a weight of corruption.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM ADOPTED AT SALEM ON APRIL 25, 1876, BY THE STATE CONVENTION.

The Democracy of Oregon in Convention assembled, re-affirms the platform of principles adopted at the late State Convention, and adopt the following in addition to the same, to-wit:

- Resolved, That the action of the Democratic House of Representatives of the United States, in ferreting out corruption and bringing criminals to justice, merits the commendation of every true patriot.
Resolved, That the large influx of Chinese immigration to the States of the Pacific coast of America has been a curse to the country; that the Chinese are a people that have not, and never can be brought to have, any interest consistent with the welfare and prosperity of our Government and its institutions; and that we pledge ourselves to use our best endeavors for the adoption of such measures as will prevent and cure this growing evil.
Resolved, That our inestimable system of common schools, and our no less valuable scheme of religious toleration, are the workmanship of Democratic hands, and the fruits of Democratic policy; that it is the exclusive right and duty of the State to provide for the education of its children; and it having been a principle established in the formation of our State Constitution that no public funds of any class should be used for sectarian schools or societies we declare our faithful adherence to this principle, and oppose any invasion of it; that it is the inalienable right of every citizen to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience, and no political disabilities should be incurred by reason of religious belief; and while we will defend these principles and institutions to the full extent, we deprecate all attempts to raise sectarian issues as utterly unbecoming and reprehensible and meriting the emphatic condemnation of every good citizen.

SLIPPERY DICK'S SUICIDE.—Dick Williams thinks the Democratic House is wasting time by uprooting fraud—at least, so he said at the Republican Convention the other day. This was a most unfortunate speech for oleaginous Richard, says the Standard, for it was virtually his public suicide. A person who is audacious enough to say that he is opposed to the prosecution of criminals in high places, and against the furtherance of justice, should not expect the votes of even his own party. If there is no sense in the Democratic investigating committees our courts ought to be abolished on the same principle.

I HAVE LATELY BROUGHT OUT from the East two pure blood imported Percheron stallions, the best I could find.

PRIDE OF PERCHE and Came out from France to Ohio in 1874, and was imported to 75 in Wisconsin. He is a dark dapple gray, well formed, fine style, good disposition, with a graceful, free, easy action that I have never seen equaled in any horse of his size.

I do not wish to be understood as claiming that this stock of horses is the only one that all breeders should patronize exclusively; but that there is no breed or family of large horses known that cross so well with the common stock of the country, and their produce will equal them in solid form, size, style and action, which is no doubt from the fact that the Percheron has descended from the Arab, as will be seen by the following:

This was a Percheron stallion imported from France by Jeff. K. Clark, of St. Louis, Mo., weighing 1,700 pounds, who trotted on the St. Louis Fair Grounds, with two men in a barouche, a mile in 3:42. I have seen this horse.

The Germantown Telegraph states that at the Norfolk County Fair a pair of stallions of the Percheron breed, attached to an omnibus containing six people, drew it one mile in four minutes.

This, I think, is better time than most of horses bred from celebrated trotters could make with the same load.

The sire of Lulu, who is designated by sporting men as the "Queen of the turf," having made the three best mile heats on record, was a half-blood Norman.
