REVOLUTION IN GRAIN SACKS .-- I seems that there is to be a revolution in the matter of grain sacks. Yesterday we heard a prominent dealer offer to give a farmer 25 cents per ton more for his grain if he would use cotton sacks instead of burlap. He claims that instead of attracting, the cotton repels moisture, and that the ravages of mice are not half so great as when burlaps are used. As an illustration, he asserts positively that mice will not touch cotton sacks so long as there are any burlaps within their reach. If this can be proven by actual experiment, the revolution in sacks will be speedy and complete. The burlap sacks are now seiling at 14 cents, while only 121 cents are asked for cotton sacks. The experiment is worth a trial, to say the least of it .- Stockton Herald.
