GOV. LEWIS DECLARES FOR TILDEN. -A dispatch dated Nashville, Aug. 30th, says ex-Governor D. P. Lewis, of Alabama, elected Governor by the Bepublicans in 1872, and defeated in the election of 1875, has written a letter favoring committing the administration of the general government to Tilden and Hendricks. He declares that reformation in the policy of reconstruction is as much needed as in any other branch of government, and that in the present canvass the Democratic party is on a plan that entitles it to be deemed correct. The republican theory of reconstruction by military force and terror has proved a failure, while Southern birth and residence during the war seems to furnish a sufficient reason for the exclusion of men of national sympathies from participating in the administration of government. He sees nothing in the future of the Republican party which promises any hopes to a Southern citizen of national and conservative sentiments. He declares that the practices and opinions whereby public order and peace are disturbed should receive public rebuke and punishment, and enters a solemn protest against the recent order that was promulgated by the President, stationing government troops in the Southern States with a view to intimidate the people and control their election. A government by the bayonet to take the place of a government by the ballot is an outrage which demands the condemnation or all who · love republican freedom and hate despotic power.
