PUBLIC SPEAKING.

Hon. Henry Klippel and Gen. W. H. Odell, Democratic and Republican candidates for Presidential Elector, will discuss the political issues at the following places and on the designated dates:

WHAT THE PEOPLE WANT.

The people of the United States want to see a man in the Presidential chair who has practiced reform and not one who only preaches it.

They want to see a man at the head of the government who will not owe his election to a horde of corrupt officials who will demand continuance in office for their efforts to elect him, says the Sonoma Democrat.

They want a man as President who, as Mark Twain says, will not continue to look upon such men as Babeek, Belknap, Williams and the rest of such fellows, as angels, after everyone else has discovered that they come from "the other place."

They want to see a party in power that will have at heart the welfare of the people and not the rings and monopolists who plunder them.

They want a party in power who will legislate for the good of the laboring classes of this country, and not at together for the manufacturer and foreign importer. They believe all power is inherent in them and want to exercise that power according to the Constitution, without the interference of Federal bayonets.

They are sick and tired of hearing about secession, the war and the issues settled by it, and of seeing the bloody dirt forever flung before them and want to hear Republican speakers discuss living issues occasionally.

They want a change in the management of the affairs of this government by the election of Samuel J. Tilden and Thomas A. Hendricks, and not a continuation of it by the election of R. B. Hayes and Wm. A. Wheeler. And their wants will be gratified on the 7th day of November, 1876.

The Real Issues.

The issues upon us are not war issues, but peace issues. The practical questions all the time are:

- 1st. Better men in office.
2d. Honest and intelligent administration.
3d. The war is over.
4th. Official rogues must be punished.
5th. No military interference in elections.
6th. Less taxes and more economy.
7th. The earliest practical resumption of specie payments.
8th. Government salaries and pay to conform to salaries paid for competent like services out of public life.
9th. Less federal centralization and more respect for the rights of the people.
10th. Let the common schools alone.
11th. No federal interference with religious faith, sects, or organizations.
12th. One term for the President, and a six years' service, if the Constitution is amended.

This is substantially what the Democrats are fighting for, and their candidates, if elected, will insist upon these reforms.

DEMOCRATIC PROSPECTS.

From every section of the Union comes the most flattering evidences of Democratic success in November. In the elections in the States of Vermont, Maine, Arkansas and Alabama, all of which voted for Grant in 1872, the Democracy made a gain of 100,000 votes in 500,000 and also gained 16 electoral votes out of 28, while the elections to transpire in Ohio and Indiana next Tuesday are also very favorable for the Democracy.

The accounts of the political meetings throughout the Union show decidedly that public sentiment is in favor of the Democrats. Their meetings in Chicago, Dayton, Cleveland, San Francisco and many other places, not only largely exceeded the Republican gatherings in numbers, but also in enthusiasm and intelligence.

Taking all these facts into consideration, we cannot but believe that Tilden will be elected President in November. If there is a desire on the part of the people to have reform and retrenchment in National matters, a rooting out of thieves and corrupt officials, a return to prosperity, dignity and honor, the election of Tilden and Hendricks is a foregone conclusion, for the success of Hayes and Wheeler will be but a continuation of the corruption and extravagance now so apparent in Grant's Administration.

We herewith append a table of the probable result of the Presidential election, which will doubtless prove correct, with chances of a larger majority in favor of the Democracy:

Table with columns for State, For Tilden, For Hayes, and Doubtful. Lists states like Alabama, Illinois, Iowa, etc.

According to these figures Tilden would have fifteen votes to spare, and Hayes would require fifty-nine to elect him. Conceding to him the four States classified as doubtful, he would still be short sixteen votes. Where are they to come from is a question the Republican managers have not been able to answer to their own satisfaction.

Southern Military Rule for Them.

William A. Wheeler, Republican candidate for Vice-President, is in favor of remanding the South to military rule.

Stanley Mathews, brother-in-law to Rutherford B. Hayes, Radical nominee for Congress, is for enveloping the Southern States in martial law.

Rutherford B. Hayes is for keeping a standing army in the South until every Southern State votes the Republican ticket.

Morton, Butler, Chandler, Logan, Packard, Grant and Spencer, are for applying the sword to every white man's throat and the torch to every white man's roof who declines to vote the Republican ticket.

And wherefore? That the Republican party may continue to rule the country at a cost of \$800,000,000 and the Republican leaders may be protected from the yawning doors of fifty penitentiaries.

Schurz' Opinion.

A Chicago dispatch of September 25th says the Times says that Carl Schurz while in that city frankly declared to his friends that in his opinion Ohio was lost to Hayes and Wheeler; and said also in effect that only a sense of personal loyalty compelled him to remain in the canvass, and that Grantism was defeating Hayes before the campaign was fairly open.

Hayes' Tax Returns-The Accusations Stated Briefly and in Order.

- 1. With a full knowledge of the requirements of the law, R. B. Hayes has persistently neglected to list his property subject to taxation.
2. He has for three years made false oaths as to the value of his property above his just debts.
3. He has sworn that in 1874 his property was worth only \$2,581, when that portion of it liable to be taxed turned \$50,000.
4. He has refused for three years to list his gallery of paintings and a diamond that fell to him as a residuary legatee—\$5,000.
5. He never paid any money toward the Fort Stevenson purchase, although he said he did, for the purpose of explaining the remarkable falling off in the exhibits of figures from 1873 to 1874.
6. He had in 1874-75-76 about \$9,000 worth of credits in the shape of mortgages, which he did not list; and, more than this, perjured himself by swearing he was not possessed of them.
7. He had three horses in 1874, and swore he had but one.
8. He had three watches in 1874, and swore he had but one.
9. He has had the use of thirty odd thousand dollars left as bequests by his uncle, for which he makes no return.
10. He has disregarded the law, and made no return to the Probate Court of Sandusky county for the executorship of his uncle's will.
11. In short, Rutherford B. Hayes has been guilty of false swearing for the past three years, and has swindled his country and the State of Ohio out of a large share of their just revenues.
