FACTS TO BE REMEMBERED.—Who  
nominated Rutherford B. Hayes for  
President?

It was Simon Cameron, Don Cameron,  
Bob Mackey and Bill Kemble  
who gave Mr. Hayes the vote of Pennsylvania  
and rallied around him those  
elements of the Republican party  
whose motto was, "Anything to beat  
Blaine," Blaine being disagreeable to Grant.

Who is conducting the canvass and  
running the machine to elect Rutherford  
B. Hayes? It is Zach Chandler,  
Don Cameron, and all that school of  
machine politicians.

If Hayes should be elected he would  
owe his election to those men, as he  
already owes them his nomination.

If he were President would he have

of Administrative reform, a principle for  
which the people and many influential  
leaders of current opinion have this  
year developed a wonderful enthusiasm."  
There will be a wide-spread  
feeling of regret that a higher  
standard was not reached; THAT A  
MAN was not nominated for President  
who has had an active hand in purifying  
the party!"

THE great race for the Centennial  
Cup at Jerome Park was run Thursday,  
the 12th ult., and won by Tom  
Ochiltree, beating Acrobat, Big Sandy  
and D'Artagnan. The distance was a  
four-mile dash for four-year-olds and  
was run in 7:37. This is twenty seconds  
slower than Ten Broeck's race at  
Louisville, but these horses, though of  
the same age as Ten Broeck, carried  
ten pounds more weight. The weights  
at Saratoga, Long Branch and Jerome  
Park are 118 pounds for four-year-olds;  
and that being considered we call this  
a fast race. Tom Ochiltree had on  
fourteen pounds more than his great  
sire, Lexington, carried in his memorable  
race against time. Acrobat, who has  
second, was owned by Lexington.  
Big Sandy and D'Artagnan were by  
Australian and Lightning respectively  
and were grandsons of Lexington.

BLUE JEANS WILLIAMS' majority  
in Indiana is nearly 6,000; and as the  
Record-Union said on the morning of  
the Indiana election, "well informed  
observers predict that Williams will  
not put a full party vote and that Tilden  
will secure a much larger showing  
in November," any school boy can tell  
who will get the electoral vote in November.

ROBESON AND SOME OTHERS.—Secretary  
Robeson continues to direct the  
Jersey canvass from the Cattell mansion  
at Monmouth Beach, that is, the  
house called his, but the Cattells built  
it and paid for it and put it in his  
name. The New Jersey politicians  
hold some weekly rendezvous there,  
but the Secretary is extending his plan  
of operations to other states, and to a  
certain extent directing the canvass in  
Delaware. In that State Stewart L.  
Woodford is the leading Radical card.  
He does not speak much in his own  
State this year because a revival of the  
remembrances of his participation in  
the slave trade established by testimony  
before a court some years ago  
has rendered him apprehensive of  
meeting the fate of Dittchenhofer, who  
was driven out of Ohio by the proof  
of his being an accomplice of the  
Whisky Ring, and the largest gainer  
by its operations under the two dollar  
tax in New York. Dittchenhofer was  
appointed a Judge by Morgan, and  
turned out that Morgan, Weed and Senator  
John Sherman of Ohio, were the  
largest profilers by the scheme which  
advanced the tax on whisky \$2 a gallon,  
and exempted stocks on hand  
from the operation of the act. Under  
the \$2 tax, the Government was de-  
frauded out of over six hundred million  
of dollars, which is one of the  
debts of gratitude due from the country  
to such patriots as Morgan, Seward  
and John Sherman.

MORE of it—white washing, we  
mean. The last application of the political  
lime-brush has been to the  
would-be gubernatorial person of Con-  
gressman Anthony of Kansas, in vindication  
of whom the Republican State  
Committee passed the following resolution:  
"Resolved, That it is the  
opinion of the Republican State Central  
Committee, after hearing a full  
and complete explanation by G. T.  
Anthony of the charges and specifications  
made against him, that such explanation  
is a complete vindication of his  
character." Anthony has to answer  
for embezzling some \$9,000 from  
Orleans county school fund. The Republican  
party is a wonderful adept in  
this business. It never convicts any  
of its members. The Democratic party,  
however, does not hesitate to punish  
its own delinquents with impartial  
severity. It was Charles O'Connor and  
Samuel J. Tilden, who threw Tweed  
into prison and drove Sweeney and Con-  
nelly into exile.

THE Thompson river races in Cariboo  
were well attended, as we learn  
from the Colonist. Butralph beat Nell  
Flaherty twice, she being left at the  
post the second time. The race at  
half-mile heats between Butralph and  
Trifle was won by the stallion also.

crippled mares like Nell and Trifle;  
they should be devoted to improving  
the blood stock of the country.
