CHARLESTON, Dec. 11th.—Sixteen negroes were arrested in Abbeville county, South Carolina, charged with the murder of two white men, whom they ambushed and shot near Lowndesville Monday. Six of the negroes made a confession implicating their fellow prisoners and divulging a plot for the murder of the white men of the village and capture of the women; 20 of them were in the conspiracy. Of the 16 arrested 13 started from Lowndesville to Anderson, the intention being to send them from Anderson to Abbeville by railroad. This roundabout course was adopted to prevent lynching by men said to be on the direct road from Lowndesville to Abbeville. The prisoners started for Anderson Saturday under a strong guard, but up to last evening had not been heard from. It is rumored they have been intercepted and lynched by a party from Georgia, but no confirmation of the report has reached Charleston. Two of the prisoners had been hurt when captured, and the party may have stopped on the road to ease the wounded, especially as the weather has been so cold.

AN exchange paper says: "There are no business men in the world so subject to the sponging process as publishers of newspapers. It really seems that public corporations, societies and associations in general, and many persons, have a funny notion about papers. They think we ought to print, puff and publish all for nothing, that is, free gratis. In other words, they seem astonished if we ask half price only for an obituary notice, a personal communication, or anything else that only interests a few persons, and not the general reader. They forget that it takes money to pay the compositors, to buy ink, type and paper, and lastly, they often forget to thank you for gratuitously serving them or the public."

NOVEL PRESIDENTIAL CHAIRS.—Seth Kimman, of San Francisco, hunter, trapper and Presidential chair-maker, has finished the job and is waiting for tidings from the doubtful States before calling in an expressman. In 1866 he presented Mr. Buchanan with a chair made of elk horns and hoofs; in 1864 he sent Mr. Lincoln one just like it; and Mr. Johnson was favored with a chair made of grizzly bear skins and claws. MORE DOGS THAN HE WANTED.

—An editor in Reading advertised, the other day, that he "would take a good dog in payment of one year's subscription" for his paper. The next day forty-three dogs were sent to the office. The day afterward when the news had spread into the country, four hundred farmers had sent two dogs apiece by express, with eight baskets full of puppies, all marked C. O. D. In the meantime, the offer found its way into neighboring States, and before the end of the week there were eight thousand dogs, tied up with ropes, in the editor's front and back yard. The assortment included all kinds, from bloodhounds down to poodles. A few hundred broke loose, and swarmed on the stairways and in the entries and stood outside the sanctum and howled, and had fights and sniffed under the crack of the door as if they were hungry for some editor. And the editor climbed out the window, up the water-spout, and out on the comb of the roof, and wept. There was no issue of the paper for six days, and the only way the friends of the eminent journalist could feed him was by sending lunch up to him in ball-ows. At last somebody brought a barrel of arsenic and three tons of beef and poisoned the dogs; and the editor came down only to find on his desk a bill from the Mayor for eight thousand dollars, being the municipal tax on dogs at one dollar per head. He is not offering the same inducements now, and he doesn't want a dog.—Mar Adeler.

EFFECT OF RECOIL IN RIFLE SHOOTING.—It has been a question with marksmen, says the Springfield (Mass.) Union, whether the recoil or "kick" of a pistol or rifle occur before the ball left the bore. Many have contended that it did not, and that the tendency of a pistol to "throw up" did not affect its accuracy. A recent experiment seems to have shown conclusively that the recoil occurs before the ball leaves the bore and does not affect its direction. The experiment was this: A rifle barrel, twelve inches long for convenience, was secured to a solid bed in such a way as to prevent any movement but that of recoil directly to the rear and upward. In this situation it was fired a number of times, and the balls followed each other into the same hole in the target. An incline or wedge was then made fast upon the bed at the rear of the barrel in such a way that the breech would be raised as it slid back in the recoil. Fired under these conditions, it sent the balls lower than before. This showed that the recoil and subsequent elevation of the breech occurred in season to affect the direction of the ball, that is, before it had left the bore. Of course the length of the barrel has an effect in several ways upon the degree in which the recoil affects the accuracy of the shooting.

SHERIDAN'S OPINION.—The Albany Argus of Nov. 20th says: General Sheridan's opinion of Governor Wells, President of the Louisiana Returning Board, was expressed in a letter to Secretary Stanton, in 1867. He said: "I say now, individually, that Governor Wells is a political trickster and a dishonest man. I have seen him myself, when I first came to this command, turn out all Union men who supported the Government and put in their stead rebel soldiers, some of whom had not yet doffed gray uniforms. I have seen him again during the July riot of 1866 skulk away where I could not find him to give a guard instead of coming out as a manly representative of the State and joining those who were preserving the peace. I have watched him since, and his conduct has been as sly as the mark left in the dust by the movement of a snake." And in a letter to Gen. Grant, General Sheridan said again: "He [Governor Wells] has embarrassed me very much since I came in command by his subterfuge and political chicanery. He has not one friend who is an honest man."

THE SUN'S COMPARISON.—The New York Sun says the spirit of the Republican politicians in the present emergency is exemplified in their action in Oregon where they were so infuriated against Grover. Because he gave a certificate of election to the eligible elector who had the highest number of votes, that it became necessary to station a guard at his house to protect him from violence. If Grover had been Governor of Louisiana instead of being a Democratic Governor of Oregon, how suddenly federal troops would have been sent to his relief, and what oburgations would have been laid upon his assailants.
