March on the organ, by Miss Ida Martin. The installation ceremonies were conducted in a superior manner by Past Master T. G. Reames, ably assisted by Alex. Martin, Grand Marshal for the occasion. The music by the choir, consisting of Misses Mollie McCully, Eliza Langell and Cora Linn, sopranos, Miss Matilda Miller, alto, R. S. Dunlap, tenor, and Henry Pape, Sr., and N. Langell, bass, assisted by Miss Ida Martin on the organ, was first-class. Owing to the want of time, Mr. Bell's oration was omitted, and he favored the audience with a brief but excellent address.
