#### MONEY MAKING.

The Tribune's Washington special says: The mints of the United States have not recently been able to coin trade dollars as rapidly as they have been wanted by bullion and exchange rows of that people, and am willing dealers. During the month of January the San Francisco mint coined \$10,820,000 in trade dollars, but the monthly deposits are still in excess of the coining capacity. Deposits of bullion for these coins have been declining for some months past. At the Philadelphia and Carson mints depositors pay a coinage charge for trade dollars of 11 per cent., an advance of having recently been made. Moneys accruing from this charge are paid without deduction into the treasury. About \$21,000,000 of the \$50,000,000, change money authorized by law to be issued remain to be coined, which, altlement and repair, will occupy the mints until about February, 1878. After that it will be necessary to begin the coinage of half and quarter eagles to meet the requirements of the country on and after January, 1879, the time fixed by law for resumption. Nearly With the chains of the usurper still all gold and silver bullion purchased deposited for coinage. Should Congress authorize coinage of the silver dollar during the present session, which is not probable, it would be necessary to reduce the rate of silver change coinage at the Philadelphia mint in order to manufacture dollar pieces, and that would materially prolong the time for completing the coinage of silver change money. Should the coinage of the silver dollar not be authorized during the present session. the coinage of trade dollars will be increased as soon as it shall be practicable to relax the production of subsidiary coins. THE CHINESE QUESTION. - In the Senate, West, from the Appropriation Committee, reported back, without recommendation, Hamlin's amendment to the Postal Appropriation bill appropriating half a million to the Pacific Mail service. Mr. Sargent submitted an amendment to that of Hamlin's, providing that the whole number of passengers of Asiatic birth or descent received on board the steamers of the company, to be landed at any place or places on the continent of America or neighboring islands, shall at no time exceed one passenger for every fifteen registered tons, and, on any violation of this provision, payment from the appropriation shall cease. Ordered printed. This amendment, Sargent thinks, will advantageously open up a discussion of the Chinese question and help secure as great a practical restriction on Mongolian immigration as can probably be obtained this session in any incidental way. The chances are, at all events. that no better opportunity will be presented for action of any kind on the Chinese question during this Congress.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 15.-To-day, while "Gov."
