

COUNTY COURT.—The March term of the County and Probate Courts will be held next week.

TAKEN BELOW.—Solon Colver, of Phenix, was last week examined before Judge Day by Dr. Covert and adjudged insane. He was taken to East Portland on Sunday last by E. D. Foudray, Esq.

ANOTHER DECAPITATION.—L. S. Dyar, who has been agent at the Klamath Indian Agency for several years past, was removed recently. Rev. J. H. Rook, of Salem, has been appointed to supersede him.

RELIGIOUS MEETING.—Elder Martin Peterson informs us that Elder E. W. Barnes will commence a protracted meeting at the M. E. Church in Jacksonville next Friday, March 9th. The meeting will continue for some time. The public is invited to attend.

ACCIDENT.—Martin Laist, while at work in a mining claim on Jackson creek last week, came near being crushed by a falling bank. Fortunately Thos. Brown was near at hand and extricated him from his dangerous position. His injuries are quite severe, though not necessarily serious.

SCHOOL MONEY APPORTIONMENT.—The apportionment of the money for the support of the various school districts in this county will be made in a few days. Sheriff Manning calls on the tax-payers who are yet behind to come forward and pay up, so the apportionment may be as full as possible.

THE RAIN.—We have been favored with another fine rain, which has continued the greater part of this week. Many of the miners have enough water to do some ground-sluicing, and quite an amount of gold may yet be taken out this season. Last week's rain was all the farmers needed for the present, but, as the crops are about all in, no injury is liable to result from what storms may yet come. Vegetation is advanced and looks well.

LAND JUMPED.—Some land jumping is going on in the vicinity of Butte creek. Jos. Swingle's land has been squatted on by these jumpers, and one even stuck up a notice in Geo. Rattie's orchard, claiming it and its surroundings. This land is not surveyed, but has been occupied for some time. Mr. Rattie intends having his surveyed immediately and will then pre-empt it. Knowles, now confined in jail, is one of the persons engaged in this business.

FROM JOSEPHINE.—Hon. W. W. Fidler, of Josephine county, was in town this week and favored us with a call. He reports the miners in his section having a fair run of water, but, as little snow fell in the mountains, the supply will not hold out as long as usual. Jack Layton is pushing work on his new ditch, which will be completed in the course of a few weeks. He is mining with water from his lower ditch. Grain is scarce there, wheat commanding ninety cents a bushel. Mr. Fidler returned home yesterday.

Barron, administrator, files his fourth semi-annual statement, which was approved.

HEAVY CROP IN.—Wm. Bybee has about five hundred acres in grain this season. He expects to fatten and drive 1,000 hogs out of the county next Fall. This is doing things on an extensive scale.

JUSTICE'S COURT.—The following proceedings transpired in Chief Justice Kent's Court this week: John L. Badger vs. Veit Schutz; suit to recover money. Judgment for plaintiff for \$7.

GALICE CREEK NEWS.—Isaac Cox was up from Galice creek last Saturday, and reports matters quiet there. The late rains have furnished considerable water and the miners are all at work. The English company has been working three claims and tearing the gravel away at a lively rate. Bybee & Co. have their hydraulic in operation, but, owing to the small supply of water, will not do much this season. They have a new fifteen-inch pipe, 1,000 feet in length, and a large body of dirt, supposed to be of good quality, to work on. Other mines are also being worked by hydraulics and the various other modes. Mr. Cox brought up some rock from the quartz ledge of Bybee, Scott & Co., which is said to be exceedingly rich in both gold and silver. They have gone down about twenty-five feet, and the rock seems to get better the deeper they go. The proprietors are sanguine of having a big thing. They have a portion of a quartz mill already on the ground and expect to complete it ere long, having a splendid water power conveniently at hand by which to run the large over-shot wheel that will be the motor of the mill. Mr. Cox is of the opinion that Galice creek will be one of the principal mining camps of the Coast in time.

THE LATEST.—As we went to press yesterday the Electoral count had not been finished, which leaves only to-day to complete it in. A strong effort has been made upon the part of Northern Democrats to filibuster and delay the count until after the 5th of March, which would necessitate a new election this year. But enough Southern Democrats were opposed to such a course the first of the week to defeat it in connection with the Republicans. If the Democrats are united on filibustering now we are not advised, but the count seems to be unnecessarily slow otherwise. For the sake of common justice and decency and in regard for the feelings of an outraged people, we trust the consummation of this infamous count will be frustrated.
