A CHEAP STUMP PULLER.—Pro-The Democratic Times. cure two screw jacks and a stout log chain, at a cost of about \$15. Then take a strong beam eight feet long, and two pieces of plank for the jacks to stand upon; also some blocks to raise FANCY GOODS, the jacks if necessary. Then place the beam across the largest and stoutest root of the stump, and resting on a piece of plank. The chain is passed around the root and the beam. One READY-MADE CLOTHING, man at each jack will raise almost any stump to the full lift of the screw, which in a majority of cases is sufficient; if not, place a stud under each end of the beam, let down the jacks and place blocks under them, give the stump another lift.
