THE MEXICAN TROUBLES.

For a number of weeks the news reports have contained accounts of fillibustering schemes and other anticipated troubles between our people and the Mexicans, all growing out of the raids of Mexican banditti upon the Texan border. These depredations have been carried to such extent as to require the attention of the authorities at Washington, and instructions have been issued by the Secretary of War to General Ord, commanding the Rio Grande Department, to put a stop arrested. to these raids, even if it should be necessary to follow the thieves into Mexican territory and there punish them. Ordinarily this would be casus belli, but at present is not at all likely to be productive of such result. The present unsettled state of political affairs in Mexico renders the quasi government now running that country utterly powerless to suppress these raids, and the efforts of our military can only be construed as an additional police force lent to that government by ours for the apprehension and punishment of a common enemy. However, these instructions have had the effect of reviving the rumors of trouble with our sister republic. We do not suppose that any such conclusion can be drawn from the facts, or that there is any purpose of the kind entertained at Washington. Adventurous and irresponsible persons may entertain schemes of successful fillibusterings based upon a possible rupture, but that, we opine, is all they can do. Certain it is, however, that if the Mexican authorities are too feeble or negligent to control their robber element it must be done for them; and as we are the sufferers by their depredations it is necessary that our government must assume that responsibility, even though that necessitates the crossing of the frontier. Oregon's Population.

It is thought by the Salem Record that the government census of 1880 will show a population in Oregon of two hundred thousand. We are of the opinion it will be larger, says the Oregonian. Last November the vote of the State was 30,000, which at the usual ratio would indicate a population of 150,000 at that time.
