Since the recent unfortunate occurrence in Kemper county, there has been no outbreak nor any demonstrations towards violence. I visited the scene of the trouble as soon as the report reached me, and remained there a part of two days. I made a full investigation and conversed freely with the family of Judge Chisholm. I afterward visited the Judge of the district, who was at the time holding a session of court at Columbus, and obtained his promise to hold a special term of the circuit court, with a view to a full judicial investigation. As Capt. Shaughnessy's volunteering necessary force to protect the widow was made ten days after the attack, when everything was quiet, and as eight days have since elapsed and quiet still prevails, I should say the reports heralded through the north, based solely upon his telegram, was rather highly colored. It is not true Mrs. Chi-holm and her husband were in danger of assassination while the latter was lying wounded at home. It is not true that her residence was guarded by a mob, day and night; that they swore to take her husband's life, and that she was not allowed ingress or egress without a pass from the heads of the mob. No one justifies the act by which Judge Chisholm lost his life. Everything that is possible shall be done to arrest and punish the guilty parties. I do not hope to silence the misrepresentations of men who are making political capital out of the unfortunate affair. The South has been too long the victim of misrepresentation for your people to become willing suddenly to hear both sides before condemning. The recent telegrams and articles that have appeared in Northern papers are based solely upon my refusal to consent to the invasion of Kemper county by a body of men from other counties. The folly of consenting to such a proposition, when no trouble was apprehended, must be apparent to every reasonable person.

WHAT IS A PEANUT ?- The peanut is the fruit of what is called a papilionaceous plant, rising to the height of about fifteen inches, being very like the field pea with yellow flowers. They are known in England as the ground nut, for the reason that the branches, after flowering, bend down till they touch the ground, into which they work themselves, and upon them grow the pods that contain the nuts. When the nuts are ripe the plant dies. It is then pulled up, and the nuts which adhere to the twigs are collected. The pods usually contain two nuts, but sometimes one, and very rarely three. Ground nuts are grown in light, sandy soils in most tropical countries, and have long been used in Africa, India, Brazil and other places as food. The best are raised on the banks of the river Gambia, where they are extensively grown in large fields. They yield large quantities of oil; and for thirty years they have been grown in Africa as an article of commerce, and are now largely exported for crushing. The oil differs in quality and price according to the care with which it is refined. That made in London is accounted equal to fine olive oil. 
