

THE FEDERAL RING POILED.

The upshot of the Senatorial investigation will be the complete vindication of Senator Grover on the libelous charges made against him and the utter discomfiture of the Federal brigade that conceived them.

More Testimony.

Capt. Caton and B. F. Dowell have given in their testimony in the Grover investigation, of which the following is a synopsis.

M. Caton was called and sworn. Senator Sausbury—Have you read the testimony of Mr. Danforth?

Q—Did you ever agree or propose to run a straight Republican ticket for the purpose of securing the election of a Democratic ticket in your county? A—I never did.

Q—Did you ever urge it to be done upon the consideration that Gov. Grover would suspend the execution upon any judgment against Dowell and May? A—No, sir.

Q—Did you ever tell Mr. Danforth or any one else that you had such an agreement? A—Never told anything of the kind.

Q—Had Gov. Grover or any person else indicated to you that if you would pursue that course to secure the election of the Democratic ticket, that Grover or anybody else would suspend the execution against those parties? A—Never.

Called and sworn—Reside in Jacksonville; am a Republican; am the proprietor of the Standard; was one of the bondsmen of Samuel E. May; there never was any proposition made to me to run a Republican ticket in that county so as to elect two Democrats to vote for Grover; had some letters that were contrary to what Danforth swore to.

We notice that much complaint is being made about the scarcity of U. S. troops in this department. Some Republicans, without due consideration, at once lay the blame at the doors of the Democracy, and say it is due to their clamor for the reduction of the army.

THE EASTERN WAR.

Latest accounts indicate that the Russians are recovering from their disasters in Asiatic Turkey, and are now in a fair way to get the best of the Turks, the latter having abandoned movements intended. In European Turkey the Russian advance to the Balkans seems to be meeting almost no opposition.

Indian War News.

The following is the Mercury's report of the last battle: SOUTH FORK CLEARWATER, mouth of Cottonwood Creek, July 17th, 1877. July 14—Lieut. Fletcher and A. D. Chapman found Chief Joseph's band, after a long and tedious march, with his full force, camped here to-day, in an almost inaccessible defile between two high mountains, near the river.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

JACKSONVILLE, July 17th. The Board of Trustees met this evening in regular session, at the usual hour, all the members present, with President Linn presiding.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The Committee on the application of H. K. Hanna for a title deed to certain described premises made their report, which was accepted, and, upon motion of Mr. Kubli, the deed was ordered executed.

A deed was also ordered executed to L. J. C. Duncan for certain described premises. The Cemetery Committee reported that they had examined the Cemetery grounds and found everything in good condition; also recommending that the Sexton be authorized to procure a new and suitable tier. Report adopted.

The Committee on street lamps reported that they had ascertained the probable cost of lamps for lighting the streets. The report was accepted.

Mr. Reamos then moved that the same Committee be authorized to purchase of the Willamette Iron Works street lamps and also to procure suitable wooden lamp-posts to be placed as follows: One at the old Menor corner; one at the corner of the Masonic building; one near Flynn's stable; one at the corner of Third and California streets, opposite the express office; one on the corner of California and Fourth streets, (Mrs. McCully's residence); and one at the Catholic Church corner.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

JULY TERM. Officers present—Hon. Silas J. Day, Judge; Samuel Furry and A. Miller, Jr., Commissioners; E. D. Foudray, Clerk.

The bridge built across the north fork of Rogue river, on the county road to Fort Klamath, was received by the Court, and the sum of \$360, the contract price, paid to James Miller, contractor.

The road running from Reese's barn, (on county road from Eagle Point to Big Butte saw mill), by way of Kennedy's ferry on Rogue river, intersecting the county road to Fort Klamath, was established, the petitioners for the road having paid F. L. Johnson the sum of \$30, the amount awarded him by the viewers to assess his damages.
