

> > TOMATO CATSUP. - For 4 or 5 quarts of catsup boil 1 peck of ripe tomatoes 15 minutes without removing the skin. and strain through a sieve; put into a little bag 1 teaspoonful of whole cloves, 1 tablespoonful of ground cinnamon, allspice and black pepper, and put these with 1 pint of good vinegar into the strained tomatoes, and boil the whole carefully from 3 to 5 hours; when sufficiently boiled and condensed stir 1 tablespoon of ground mustard and 1 teaspoonful of ground cayenne pepper, salt to taste, and keep in well corked bottles. This catsup will keep for years.
