GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

Extensive quartz developments are reported from Cariboo. Lawyers should sleep well. It is immaterial on which side they lie.

Atlanta, Oct. 11.—The Republican State committee has disbanded. Of 112 members present 10 voted aye. Attorney General Devens will ask Congress to appropriate \$255,000 to cover the deficiency in his department the fiscal year.
