GLYCERINE FOR OIL STONES.—Almost every one has more or less use for an oil stone, but in these days a good oil is hard to obtain, and kerosene is often used instead. This is a bad plan, for, although it makes the steel take hold, it ruins the stone. Glycerine is much better, does not dry on the stone, and is easily washed off when dirty. Use soap or soda and water to clean the stone, and then apply the glycerine. Clean water is only needed to wash the stone with, and if treated in that way it can be kept bright for a long time with the grit unimpaired.
