TRANSPLANTING .- A rule without an exception in transplanting is this: Place the roots in contact with as much soil as possible. This is very important with nursery-grown evergreen trees which have a mass of roots, and all other fine-rooted plants or vines, When a Boston girl accepts a lover she such as strawberries, raspberries, grapes, etc. It is not enough that a nice place is prepared to receive the tree or plant with all the roots in natural position, or that the finest earth is used in filling up. Nor is it sufficient that the roots are carefully spread out THE OLD TEMPLE of FASHION before the earth is put onto them. All these things must be done, and then it is necessary to see that, in filling up, the roots are not crowded into a mass without earth between. The hole may be of proper size, the roots spread out nicely, the finest earth may be used, and the tree shaken well when filling about the roots, and still they may be JACKSONVILLE, - - OREGON, flattened together so as to touch no soil, except at the bottom.
