

ANOTHER INDIAN WAR.

Idaho and the surrounding country are again convulsed in an Indian war, which promises to be more formidable than any that has occurred for many years. The Indians that lead this revolt are the Bannocks, inhabiting Camas Prairies, about fifty miles southwest of Boise City. They number only two or three hundred warriors themselves, but have been reinforced by the Plutes, Shoshones, Malheurs and one or two other tribes, which will swell the ranks of the hostiles to many hundreds. The redskins have commenced their usual ravages—robbing and murdering settlers, running off stock and causing general consternation wherever they are liable to go. These depredations have not been very extensive yet. They are now reported to be concentrating at Stein's mountain, said to be a very rough region and calculated to afford them safety under ordinary circumstances. It is situated in Baker county and is a fine grazing country, several thousand head of cattle being herded there.

Volunteers from Idaho, Nevada and Oregon are already in the field, while General Howard has ordered a large force of regulars to the scene of the hostilities. Prompt and decisive action may nip the affair in the bud; but, as the Christian soldier seems to be adopting his former tactics of endeavoring to quiet the savages with prayer, it is doubtful how long the war may be prolonged.

It is feared that the trouble will spread to Lake county, but there seems to be no foundation for this apprehension at present, though necessary precautions are always in order. Thos. G. Reames, of this place, on Saturday last received a message from Governor Chadwick, announcing that the hostilities were congregating at Stein's mountain and suggesting that a messenger be sent to warn the settlers of Lake county of the danger to be apprehended. Mr. Reames canvassed the matter and succeeded in getting a messenger (Louis Land) off that night.

This trouble, as are all others generally, is but a result of the infamous peace policy inaugurated under Gen. Grant and continued by Mr. Hayes. Whenever the Indian department is turned over to the military and strict justice meted out, then will this troublesome question solve itself and our frontier be assured safety and prosperity. And not until then will we have immunity from the murderous attacks of the fractious savages, who ever will remain untamed and unrelenting.

A Veteran in the Field.

That gallant old veteran, Gen. Joe Lane, who for so many years has unostentatiously been living in the peaceful precincts of his mountain home, now offers his services to Governor Chadwick, desiring to command any expedition that may be sent out against the hostile Indians. The General is nearly eighty years of age; but time has not dimmed the patriotism so prominent in his character, nor has the bravery that distinguished him at Vera Cruz and throughout the Mexican and our early Indian wars suffered by the ravages of the long years that have intervened. He would make an admirable leader and plan an effective campaign.

A Neat Showing.

Although Jackson county sorely disappointed in public expectation, the vote of this judicial District is nevertheless one that will recommend itself. In the counties of Jackson, Josephine and Lake, Whiteaker received 417 majority; Reames, 449; Brown, 393; Nolte, 369; Stites, 371. Mr. Thayer's majority is 258, which is quite respectable under the circumstances. With the disappearance of the Greenback delusion, the Democracy of these counties expect to roll up 500 majority at a no distant day.

Gallant Lake.

To Lake county belongs the credit of electing Mr. Thayer Governor of Oregon. He not only carried every precinct in the county, but also received 76 majority more than the average. Lake outdid herself this time.

Hurray for Stites!

The latest returns denote the election of Hon. T. J. Stites as State Superintendent of Public Instruction by about 100 majority over Powell. This defeats the last preacher. Mr. Stites will make an excellent officer, as he is well qualified for the position.

The Potter Commission.

The investigation of the Presidential election in Louisiana and Florida, now in progress under the management of the Potter committee, is bringing out the facts in the case and paints a very dark picture. The frauds that obtained in giving those States to Hayes are now admitted by those who were instrumental in perpetrating them. Such Republicans lights as John Sherman, J. M. Harlan, Stanley Matthews and other intimate friends and active champions of His Fraudulency, are seriously compromised by the testimony of Anderson and various witnesses. It is not probable that Hayes will be found directly implicated; but that the work of his agents in the matter received his sanction already appears. The disclosures made by the investigation are not particularly edifying to the Republican press and its followers, who are loud in denunciation of the whole matter. They prefer to let the outrage perpetrated upon the people go unpunished, and, worse still, unnoticed. But, while the incumbent of the Presidential chair will probably not be disturbed, there is some consolation in the fact that the people will know how he got there.

Troubles Him.

The Portland Bee is seriously perturbed by the Democratic majorities from Eastern Oregon and Lake county, which swamped the Republican candidate for Governor. It does not appreciate the idea of those sections waiting to see what majority is needed and then sending down the required amount. The Bee takes a serio-comic view of the situation and calls for an investigation by the Legislature. Its party now evidently concedes the supposition that immigration has been mostly Republican as quite fallacious. Eastern Oregon always was a little rough on the Republicans, anyhow.

The official returns of Lake county, of which we have received a copy, give the following majorities: Whiteaker, 106; Thayer, 176; Reames, 89; Brown, 103; Nolte, 91; Stites, 91; Neil, 186. The entire Democratic county ticket is elected by majorities varying from four to 133. The Greenback candidates received one vote each, with the exception of Wilkins, who received five. Lake county has done exceedingly well, placing herself in front rank among the Democratic strongholds. We will next week publish a tabulated statement of the vote cast.

A Handsome Majority.

Lake county gave James R. Neil 186 majority, which elects him by 159 votes—quite a neat majority, by the way. Our cotemporary's exultations over his defeat were a little premature, it would seem. "Hoot, Kelly!"

Terms and Simplified.

Governor Robinson, of New York, is worthy to be called the great Governor of a great State. In reference to the action of Congress in adopting the Potter resolution to investigate the frauds in Florida and Louisiana, in relation to the Presidential election, he thus expresses his views: "Until the matter is probed to the bottom the people will not be satisfied, and the country will be in a feverish state and the question constantly agitated. The opposition of the Republicans to an investigation will be received as a quasi admission of wrong. The investigation will not affect the business of the country. Its result, whatever it may be, will tend to a more settled feeling of security. If the investigation shows Hayes to have been elected, the result will be accepted as final and the cry of 'fraud' will be hushed. If it shows that Tilden Electors were chosen in Florida and Louisiana, it may not be possible to secure the seating of the rightful President, but it will bring down upon the conspirators, high and low, the condemnation of a cheated and defrauded people, and will remind the guilty parties who inspired the wrong, or participated in it, to oblivion or to prison. The address of the Republican Congressmen is ridiculous."
