THE AYER AND GOIN. The Sentinel of Wednesday last intimates that Gen. John E. Ross is ready and willing to explain the disappearance of about thirteen thousand dollars' worth of commissary stores remaining unused at the end of the Modoc war.

"If Gov. Thayer carries out the intentions of the Investigating Committee the parties who fished the unused stores cannot escape exposure." The italics are ours. What can be more ridiculous than this? Here was a committee appointed by the Legislature to inquire into the affairs of the commonwealth.

If any official be proven guilty of misdemeanor there should be no exemption from penalty. If the Sentinel, Gen. John E. Ross, or any other party can produce evidence that any citizen concerned in the conduct of the Modoc campaign fished money from the treasury of the State or unlawfully appropriated any property belonging to the commonwealth, let him speak up.

Transfer of the Indian Department. The effort being made in Congress to transfer the Indians to the care of the War Department seems likely to be crowned with success. The gross mismanagement of the Indians by the agents appointed under the present policy is creating intense disgust among the more sensible members of Congress.

Not long since a petition was forwarded to our Senators at Washington, to be presented to the Postmaster General, asking for the establishment of a post route between this place and Wright's on Big Applegate, with a service of three trips per week.

The speech of Senator Grover in reply to the charges of the Investigating Committee, delivered in the U. S. Senate on the 7th, has come to hand. The Senator reviews the Committee's report in extenso, taking up the charges seriatim. We shall present the whole matter to our readers at another time.

NEW SENATORS. United States Senators have recently been elected by the Legislatures of New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, North Carolina and Missouri. Dan Voorhees has been chosen from Indiana, an event anticipated, but none the less a matter of congratulation among Democrats throughout the whole Union.

Homestead Settlers. A bill introduced by Senator Booth for the relief of homestead settlers provides that any citizen who has settled, or who may hereafter settle, on public land, either surveyed or unsurveyed, with the intention of claiming the tract under the homestead laws, shall be allowed the same time to file his homestead application and perfect his original entry in the land office as is allowed to settlers under pre-emption laws.

The Rights of a Citizen. A citizen of the United States, 21 years old, or any one who has declared his intention to become such, can now become the owner of one entire section of land—640 acres.
