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Libelers, Beware.

In view of the fact that articles of a rather libelous nature have come to the notice of the public at large, the reading of the following section of our statutes to the Grand Jury by Judge Hanna, in accordance with its provisions, created considerable commotion last week.

Sec. 539. If any person shall wilfully, by any means other than words orally spoken, publish or cause to be published, or of concerning another, any false and scandalous matter, with intent to injure or defame such other person, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months, nor more than one year, or by a fine not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than five hundred dollars.

OF THE SISKIYOU COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY'S PAIR,

At Yreka, Commencing Oct. 1, 1879

And continuing Four Days.

FIRST DAY.

Wednesday, October 1st.

No. 1.—Trotting race, three in five, free for all horses in the district that never beat three minutes. Purse \$100.00. Entrance \$10.00.

No. 2.—Running race, free for three year olds and under, single dash of one mile. Purse \$50.00. Entrance \$5.00.

SECOND DAY.

Thursday, October 2d.

No. 3.—To be called the Society's Handicap. Running race, mile heats three in five, free for all horses owned in the district with the following penalties and allowances: The winner of any race of the value of \$200.00 to carry twenty-one (21 lbs.) pounds extra weight. The winner of any race of the value of \$100.00 to carry fourteen (14 lbs.) pounds extra weight. The winner of any race of the value of \$50.00 to carry seven (7 lbs.) pounds extra weight. The winner of any race of the value of \$25.00 to carry three (3 lbs.) pounds extra weight. Seven or more to enter and four to start. Purse \$200.00. Entrance \$5.00. Entries to close on the 1st day of Sept.

Race No. 4.—Trotting race, mile heats two in three, free for all untried horses or horses that have never trotted for public money. Purse \$50.00. Entrance \$5.00.

THIRD DAY.

Friday, October 3d.

No. 5.—Running race, mile heats three in five, free for all. Purse \$125. Entrance \$10. Same day exhibition of stock.

Race No. 6.—Trotting race, mile heats free for all three year olds owned in the district. Purse \$50.00. Entrance \$5.00.

FOURTH DAY.

Saturday, October 4th.

No. 7.—Trotting race, mile heats, three in five, free for all horses owned in the district prior to July 1st, 1879. Purse \$150. Entrance \$15.

No. 8.—Running race, half mile and repeat, free for all. Purse \$25.00. Entrance \$5.00.

Rules and Regulations.

1st.—The above purses to be given without discount.

2d.—The second horse to save entrance money except in race No. 3.

3d.—Entries to be placed in the entry box kept for that purpose at the pavilion prior to 9 o'clock P. M. on day previous to the race, except in race No. 3.

4th.—Entries must give name, pedigree and description of the horse entered as far as known.

5th.—Two or more entries make a field except in race No. 3.

6th.—All trotting to be in harness.

7th.—National Trotting Association rules to govern trotting races.

8th.—Pacific Coast rules to govern running races.

9th.—Free for all means just what it says.

10th.—In all the above races entrance money added except in race No. 3.

The following Sweep stake race is proposed: Colt Race, free for any colts in the district 14 months and under, Spring, 1879, to run at two years in the fall of '81, to be entered as follows: To name and put up ten dollars on the last day of the fair; and twenty dollars in one year from the time, and twenty dollars more the day before the race.
