GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

Ex Senator Mitchell will orate at Junction City on the Fourth of July. The Modist is the name of a new Kearney paper just started at Nevada City. Mrs. Vickers, of Canyonville, wants to sue Wm. Blackwood for \$10,000 damages for breach of promise.

Many lots in The Dalles are worth more than they were with the buildings that encumbered them before the fire. Henry W. Blair has been elected as a Republican Senator from New Hampshire, which now completes the full Senate. Cox, who murdered Mrs. Hull in New York while committing a robbery, was caught in Boston and confessed everything.

Representative men of the Butler wing of the Democratic party state that the general will receive and accept, this Fall, a labor reform and Democratic nomination for governor. A number of Oregon teamsters unloaded a lot of flour in town last week, and continued on to Reading with a quantity of wool they also brought from Rogue River Valley.—Yreka Journal.

C. Hodges, of Eugene, captured a speckled trout in the McKenzie river last week that outsize any fish of the kind we have ever heard of. It was about 18 inches in length and weighed 3 1/2 pounds. The Pendleton Independent says: Jacob Frazer has finished shearing a band of eleven thousand sheep, averaging 9 pounds to the fleece. Mr. Frazer thoroughly understands the management of sheep and his large band is free from scab.

Before us we have a quarterly report of the State prison management. The expenditures for the quarter ending May 31st were \$5,006.02. Earnings, \$2,669.82. The excess of expenditures over earnings is \$2,336.19, with an average of 165 prisoners. "Rice and I on three legs," epigrammatically remarks Gen. Ewing, "can beat Foster and Hickenlooper four." Rees; Treasurer, J. M. Bacon; Directors, Thomas Monteith, F. X. Mathieu, Joseph Watt. Crandall, Henri & Co. have had a force of 41 Chinamen at work on their mining claim on John Day's river since the first of April, and will increase the force to 200 or 300 before the close of the season. The claim was first opened in 1867, but was abandoned until the present season.

President T. M. Gatch, Miss Ellen J. Chamberlin, ex-recipient, Mrs. Joseph Holman and Miss Laura Adams, members of the Faculty of Willamette University, tendered their resignation of members of said Faculty at the late annual meeting of the Trustees of the University, which, after careful consideration were reluctantly received and accepted by the Board. Religious differences are said to be the cause.

It is gratifying to see one influential Republican sheet that has the welfare of this nation at heart, and has the courage and manliness to denounce the manner in which leaders of its party are trying to sectionalize the country. The following is from the San Francisco Argonaut, edited by Frank M. Pixley, one of the leading Republican journals of California: "If we can't elect a Republican President without lying about the South and without dragging from its sepulchre the skeleton of the civil war, without exciting sectional jealousies and stirring the angry passions of another internecine strife, we had better suffer defeat. GEN. GRANT.—The official report of the game of billiards between General Grant and the Maharajah of Jyppore, India, is now given to the public for the first time. It differs materially from the garbled and one-sided account furnished the New York Herald by John Russell Young. The General made some truly wonderful shots. His string was as long as one of Secretary Davis's sentences and the marker was nearly exhausted from overwork before the game was half ended. Grant led off by making a beautiful cushion carom, his ball turning a hand spring over the banister; it then waltzed around the room crowned on the nose of the Maharajah's dog lying under the stove, collided with and fractured a Sevres cuspidor, then crawled up the leg of the table, got the balls on the rail, "froze" them seventeen times, then coaxed them into a corner, and leisurely counted 4,351 points while the General smoked a twenty-cent cigar; after which it hopped on to a luxurious divan, picked its teeth with a jeweled dagger and fell into a gentle doze humming a Pinafore air. When the Maharajah looked at the ex-President with an interrogation point in each eye, the hero of Appomattox explained that it was simply a "scratch" and he probably wouldn't have had such another streak of luck if he were to play billiards until he was 238 years old.
