WHERE DOES THE GOLD COME FROM?—This question has never been satisfactorily answered by geologists. They can see as far into a millstone as anybody, but where the great depot or quarry from whence the gold comes that has been rasped off in particles and thrown toward the surface to be rolled in the sand by the action of running water or caught as prisoners in quartz rock while that was either held in solution or in the condition of pulverization, is the problem.

Occasionally such enormous nuggets are found, quite solitary, it seems to indicate they were broken off from a large mass somewhere and driven away in a torrent of gravel whose onward, upward force was irresistible till it met with counter currents. That old theory which supposed the precious metal was existing in a gaseous form, and occasionally precipitated by electricity into lumps which worked their way like moths from the interior through strata of the earth's compact crust, is now quite obsolete. An impression is gaining advocates that gold does actually exist in large bodies, somewhere, not very far down, from whence fragments and particles are gradually brought up by aquatic agency. This gives a more reasonable explanation of the diffusion of gold in small parcels all over the globe.

Representative Whiteaker introduced the following bill: By request, a bill for the relief of sufferers by the wreck of the Government transport Torment.

A bill authorizing the Astoria and Winemans Bay Railroad Company to construct bridges across Young's Bay, or river, and Lewis and Clark river in the State of Oregon.

A bill making appropriations for continuing the improvements at Coos Bay, Oregon.

A bill authorizing an appropriation for the improvement of the bar and entrance at Yaquina Bay, Oregon.

A bill authorizing an appropriation for the improvement of the Coquille river.

A bill appropriating \$500,000 for continuing the work of constructing locks at the Cascades, Oregon.

TREATMENT OF FROZEN PLANTS.—In times of the severe cold, the more tender plants in the window will sometimes be chilled and frozen. Such plants should not be put near the stove, to be thawed out; but kept where the temperature is a trifle above the freezing point that the thawing may be gradual, and in the dark, that deleterious chemical changes may not take place. If severely touched with the frost, it is best to remove the frozen parts, that new stems may be forced out from the buds below. Water freely, and finally bring them to the ordinary temperature for house-plants: 65 to 70 degrees.—[American Agriculturist.]
