EDITOR STANDARD—Dear Sir: I learn through the public press and also by private advices from Oregon that the convention which assembled at Albany on the 7th of April placed my name before the people for re-election to Congress.

I did not seek a public recognition from a person with whom I have lived so long and who have ever treated me with uniform kindness, I did not expect such a compliment at their hands. While I cannot fail to express my gratitude for this renewed mark of esteem and feel deeply proud of their satisfaction and endorsement of my course as their representative in the present Congress, and of their confidence in my usefulness and integrity in the future, should the people of Oregon decide to retain me here for another term, I can do so all the more sincerely that I have been so free to say in the matter I should have conferred upon another the place they have assigned to me.

In some of the measures which I have had the honor to present to Congress for its action I feel assured of success. There are a few that may fail of passage; their failure, however, (if such be the case) shall not be attributed to a want of attention and deep concern on my part, but to the common fortune that attends every proposal of Congress in the high struggle for pre-eminence, where so many diverse interests are involved.

By the will of the people of Oregon I am here as their representative to watch their interests in public legislation, to endeavor to relieve their public wants and to cast my vote as the representative of Oregon in legislation for the welfare of the whole country.

In the hands of the people of Oregon I therefore leave those interests which I remain at my post of duty. If they believe that I have served them faithfully and intelligently and that I shall continue to do so, if re-elected, they will so determine by the polls. LETTER FROM JOSEPHINE COUNTY.

WILLIAM S. CURRIE, May 14, 1880. EDITOR TIMES: The political campaign in this county is under way sufficiently now to enable us to speculate with a reasonable degree of certainty as to who will be our next county officials. After the necessary wagon accompanied by those "mutinants" which marshal the way to a desired end, the Greenback grannies and Republican stalwarts perfected, last Saturday, their long contemplated fusion. They have sought to borrow respectability for their feeble spring by calling it a people's ticket, but the discerning sense of the public is not slow in detecting characteristics which belong only to the pizarrikum species. There is too much Greenback about it to please conscientious Republicans, and too much Republicanism about it to satisfy Greenbackers of honest Democratic antecedents.

Although the Greenbackers are not sufficiently numerous in this county to impose insubordinate demands upon the census bureau, still they were able to come in for the greater percentage of the spoils. This the Republican managers were probably willing to submit to, in view of getting a stalwart for the State. Then, another thing, nearly all the Greenbackers on the ticket are of Republican antecedents. Nothing short of abject prostitution will permit Democratic Greenbackers to swallow such a dose of rank Radicalism. The Greenbackers started out originally with pledges of opposition to both the old parties, but the "obscure power of public plunder" seems likely to prove to them, as it has proven to other parties before them, an obstacle fatal to honorable consistency.

For the very prospects of some very poor offices, they are willing to coalesce with a party that has done more violence to civil liberty and brought more reproach upon republican institutions than it can atone for in an eternity of deserved defeat. That the fusionists will succeed in electing a single man on their ticket is hardly probable. The only danger is that they will not roll up such a vote as to amount to respectable opposition.

The Democratic ticket is a fair, average representation of the county and will contrast not unfavorably, so far as individual ability is concerned, with the opposition. Its election is almost a foregone certainty. Q.
