FLASHES OF FASHION.

CAUGHT AT THE SUMMER OPENINGS. The following notes on the fashions of the coming summer are from advance sheets of EMMETT'S FASHION QUARTERLY, placed at our disposal by the publishers, Messrs. Ehrich Brothers, of Eighth Avenue, New York. The cheerily high reputation of the Fashion Quarterly as a guide to the changes and caprices of fashion is a sufficient guarantee of the value of these "Flashes," which we commend to the attention of the fair among our readers. Sarah is only a soft twilled silk. The Gipsy is the coming bonnet. White is the festive dress of 1880. The "Zola" is the latest Parisian hat. Puffs in the arm-holes will be revived. Sliding rings on parasols are revived. Diverging bands continue to roam. Angel sleeves are seen on dressy costumes. Jet is more fashionable than ever this season. Tulle continues to be the preferred bridal veil. Ragans is the latest revived antique point lace. Old gold remains the most popular shade of yellow. Elegant sun-shades match the toilets this season. All fashionable ensembles are worn low or half low. All spotted and polka dotted goods will be much worn. Spanish lace has been revived for millinery purposes. Shoulder kerchiefs of large size will be very fashionable. Fur-trimmed cloaks and cashmires are never out of fashion. Sportive materials are affected by leaders of fashion. Handkerchiefs will be worn again this season. The revived Rameau point is only a decorative half real lace. Cloth of gold in all colors is used for millinery purposes. Mercerie is one of the French names for French lace. All kinds of wash goods are made up with a great deal of shirring. Tuscan straw folding fans, in circular shapes, are very fashionable. A glint of red appears on almost every toilet that is not mourning. Long-handled Japanese fans are more in vogue than folding fans. All sorts of muslin, silk and foulard shoulder kerchiefs are worn. Green and grey are the season with velvet or satin brocade ball frocks. Archery and lawn tennis have almost superseded croquet this summer. Bonnet ensembles with angel sleeves have been revived in all varieties of styles. Archery parties are the fashionable afternoon amusements this year. Monocles in sprays and flounces again appears on many dressy bonnets. Sarah silk with almost any shade of green for dressy summer toilets. Tulle continues to be the most popular summer mourning dress fabric. Boston lace is as popular as ever, but it has rivals in Langoude and Ragans. Embroidered, low-necked and polka-dotted stockings will be worn. There is an excess of the best embroidered on both costumes and millinery. Little blue caps of lace, chemise, and jet make the most stylish summer millinery. Red Sarah silk is the favorite material for illuminating dark or sober tinted costumes. Sunflowers and erysanthemums continue to be in favor with fashionable women. Any toilet or garment is fashionable that has an air of taste, originality, and newness. A young girl always looks well in a simple toilet with a small tunic formed by a bow at the waist. Little girls wear their hair loose and flowing down the back, not braided or curled. Rich and substantial fabrics are necessary when plain untrimmed suits are preferred. Almond, drab and biscuit colors prevail in de beige, hunting, and other light, all-wool suits. When intricate pearl beads are used for embroideries they should be very fine to look real. Sarah silks come in all shades of color, including those of red, yellow, heliotrope and violet. The new gold threads introduced into lace and embroideries are not carried off by washing. The favorite colors for figured lawn dresses are heliotrope, pale blue, pale rose and old gold. Black, white, and cream-tinted Sarah silks are all used as linings, as well as the brighter colors. The cream goods of this summer are of a darker and richer shade than those of previous seasons. Boston lace platings in many rows cover one side of some of the dressiest Japanese fans. Rayon is a new shade of copper yellow that is very handsome and luminous for evening wear. New Lisle-thread gloves are in all the new shades of almond, biscuit, drab, gray and wool color. Lace shoes will be worn a great deal this summer to show the colors and embroideries on stockings. Fashionable stockings are embroidered in rose-buds, forget-me-nots, buttercups and polka dots. New hosiery comes in all the new shades of old gold, orange, red, heliotrope, wine color and blue. The Lolotte is a favorite archery hat said to have been introduced by the Jersey beauty, Mrs. Langtry. The Jersey costume has not reached New York, and will not probably be here before August or September. The first painted costume worn in Paris was made for Sarah Bernhardt, the great tragedienne, at a cost of \$600. Sunset colored linings under red paragon frames gain favor with the ladies who affect the picturesque in dress. The latest thing in lingerie is a dolman visete ensemble for negligee wear in place of a dressing sash. Almost every fashionable toilet has some hint of the rage for the bright and clever notions of the Japanese. Quantities of gold lace, gold net, gold braids, galloons and cords are seen on summer bonnets and dressy hats. Portland handkerchiefs are trimmed with Boston and Livermore laces, and made into bows, jabots, and fichus.

POCKETS OF VELVET, SILK, SATIN AND LACE

are trimmed with jet and suspended from the waist by a satin ribbon. Gold threads are introduced into some of the prettiest laces, each figure being outlined with gold chain stitch. Japanese strays hats are trimmed with white laces and bows of white satin ribbon for children's wear. Turbans, Fanchons, Derbies, Japanese, Royal and Roman and Italian broad-brimmed hats will all be equally fashionable. The strings of small bonnets are more frequently tied in a bow in the back over the chignon than under the chin in front. Small Japanese round fans, with long handles, are covered with silk and satin, on which are hand-painted designs of great beauty. Turkey-red calico costumes, profusely trimmed with Langoude lace, will be worn indoors and at archery and lawn tennis gatherings. Fashionable dolman visetes of fine muskook or lawn trimmed with lace and decorated with ribbon will be very fashionable at Saratoga and Newport. Heliotropes, pansies, dandelions, carnations, gilliflowers, buttercups and roses and many other flowers are fashionable bouquet and bouton flowers. When the grounds of colored lawns are heliotrope, old gold, almond, pale blue or pale rose, the flowered borders are in bright deep tones of red, orange, brown and dull greens. Monograms and heraldic devices are embroidered in gold chain stitch on many of the new pockets or pockets, which are now used suspended from the arm instead of from the waist. Instead of woollen breakfast shawls there are now large squares of India foulard, in bright colors and gay patterns, edged with Langoude and Ragans laces, and on slightly fluted and gathered. Princess sash gosses for little people are made with loose fronts covered with tulle and insertion, while the backs are well fitted to the figure, and finished with a Spanish flounce also trimmed on the edge. Neptaline is a recently patented colorless substance held in solution, the application of which to silk, woolen, linen and cotton fabrics, paper, leathers, and other materials, renders them water repellent and proof against rain, dampness, mildew and moths. Large hats with irregular, turned-up brims are elaborately trimmed with archery plumes, flowers, gold braids and gold ornaments, and used for carriage drives, archery, garden and lawn parties, or on all occasions when dressy toilets are admissible. The most elegant of all summer evening gowns are dresses of cream or white muslin, with a fine sand cotton fabric, made up with flounces heavily embroidered in cream and white floss with gold thread chain stitching introduced as outlines to the designs. Some very pretty white short costumes are made for country wear composed of a skirt of lawn or muskook trimmed with two deep flounces edged with Italian lace and headed with intricate patterns of the same, and a long half-fitting sash adorned with a similar ruffle at the bottom and trimmed with tulle and lace insertion. The latest novelty for lawn, garden and conservatory ornament is the Gypsy flower-pot, which consists of a basin and a painted red, bonnet with gilded stripes, and suspended from a wooden tripod, seven or ten feet high, united seven inches from the top by a gilded ball, from which hangs the bronzed chain that suspends the pot.
